DESCRIPTION

KORE 2050 is the second part of the intermediate Korean courses. This course is designed for students who have completed the Intermediate Korean I (LANG/KORE 2040). This course aims to develop students' interpersonal and presentational Korean language skills in all the areas of listening, speaking, reading, and writing.
