Special Problems: Advanced Topics in Arabic: Dying in the Middle East Fall 2022

Course Description

This course is designed for students who have had at least four semesters of Arabic instruction. It explores the cultural and religious norms surrounding death in the Middle East; particular emphasis will be on the death journey of elderly and terminal patients and the right to die. The course will also shed light on the psychological death factors ignored in hospitals and the lack of hospice and palliative care. Throughout the semester, the student is expected to work on a lengthy research project and on building the required vocabulary to be able to discuss the researched topic.

Homework (10%)

 Students will submit homework on Canvas during the first three weeks of the semester. Check the list of assignments for details.

Vocabulary lists (15%)

- Throughout the semester, the student will be compiling a vocabulary list on google Docs where new words or expressions are added throughout the semester. As of week 5, a list of a minimum of 12 words must be uploaded on Canvas bi-weekly by Saturday at midnight. Please share a link to your first list by the 5th Saturday of the semester.
- Vocabulary lists must include words or expressions that are important to know for your research paper or that you came across in your readings.
 - o For nouns, please provide singular and plural forms.
 - o For verbs, please list past, the present, and gerund (MaSdar) forms and prepositions when necessary. Pay attention to MaSdar patterns as you will need to list the verb in the past and the present along with the MaSdar.

- Your instructor will provide feedback on your list. You must make any required changes along with your next list. Vocabulary lists will be graded on a scale of 1 to 12. Students will be graded on:
 - Choice of words included on the list. Students will need to judiciously include words that are relevant to their topic and necessary to express their ideas. Students are encouraged to express their ideas using previously learned vocabulary. Only include on your list vocabulary words you absolutely need to learn for your topic and avoid including words you could have expressed with vocabulary you have previously learned.
 - Corrections made to the previous list.
 - o accuracy of the words listed and the forms required.

Drafts of research paper (15%)

- The research paper is approximately 1200 words long and will explore death in the Middle East, the death journey of ill patients and how death is treated and viewed in the Middle East. It will require research and a bibliography.
- The writing is not a one-step process; instead, it will be based on several drafts, which will be edited and polished up until the submission of the final version.
 Students are expected to email the instructor four progressive writing drafts throughout the semester.
 - First draft (minimum of 300 words): due by Saturday midnight of week 4.
 - Second draft (minimum of 600 words): due by Saturday midnight of week
 6.
 - o Third draft (minimum of 900 words): due by Saturday midnight of week 8.
 - Fourth draft (minimum of 1200 words): due by Saturday midnight of week
 10.
- Check the rubric on canvas under "assignments"

Vocabulary quizzes (15%)

- You are expected to study and use the words and expressions compiled in your vocabulary list
- Two vocabulary quizzes will take place during the semester. The first quiz is during week nine, and the second one is during week 12. Contact your instructor to schedule the quiz at a convenient time.

Presentation (15%)

- During week 14, students are expected to deliver a 10-minute presentation about their research paper. Students must incorporate most of the vocabulary learned throughout the semester (from their personal vocabulary list) in the presentation.

Research paper (30%)

 The revised final draft of the research paper is due on Canvas by December 10 at midnight

List of assignments:

- Week 1: Write a paragraph about your research topic in English (i.e., finish the missing part of this syllabus).
 - To do so, please go to this google doc, click on the file, make a copy, make the necessary changes, click on share, add "najour@gmail.com" as editor, and share the link on canvas under week one homework.
 - Get started on homework for week 2
- Week 2: Share on canvas (week two homework) a preliminary bibliography for your paper; with hyperlinks to the references.
 - Two references must be in English and must be scholarly.
 - Two of your sources must be in Arabic. The Arabic references do NOT need to be scholarly or longer than two pages; instead, choose texts that are not too difficult to understand (check week 3).
 - Get started on homework for week 3
- Week 3:
 - Print out your two Arabic references. Identify words you consider central to your topic, circle them, and write their English translation in the margins.
 - Type an outline of each of your two Arabic references in Arabic and staple it to the printout and submit it to the instructor (the hard copy will be submitted to the instructor a few days after the deadline to upload it on canvas)
 - Upload the print out with circled vocabulary and outline on canvas under homework 3.

- Week 4: First draft (Minimum 300 words) due on Canvas
 - Do not forget to check last week's homework for help with vocabulary you might need.
- Week 5: First list of vocabulary; share the google doc link on canvas.
 - Check "vocabulary lists" on the first page of the syllabus for instructions about the format and expectations
 - Please be sure your instructor has permission to edit the google doc.
- Week 6: Second draft (minimum 600 words)
- Week 7: Second list of vocabulary due
- Week 8: Third draft (minimum 900 words)
- Week 9: Quiz 1 (Vocabulary of first and second lists); third list of vocabulary due but not included in quiz
- Week 10: Fourth draft of the paper due (minimum 1200 words; this draft must include your concluding paragraph/s)
- Week 11: Fourth list of vocabulary due
- Week 12: Quiz 2 (All the vocabulary covered in all 4 lists)
- Week 13: Nothing is due. Happy Thanksgiving!
- Week 14: Presentation
- Dec 10: Revised final paper due on Canvas by midnight
