Course Description

This course is designed for students who have had at least four semesters of Arabic instruction. It explores Arabic modern histories and cultures through movies while focusing on building language skills. The course aims to introduce students to the social, political, and economic realities of the Arab world, specifically focusing on the Levant and Egypt areas. In addition to Arabic cinema, students will also learn about Arab music as Arab musicians from "Al-Bustan Seeds of Culture" will visit our class three times this semester to offer talks about and demonstration of Arabic music. By the end of the semester, students are expected to carry out a lengthy writing project.

Learning Objectives:

- a. Developing language skills through watching movies, reading articles, and writing essays.
- b. Learning about social, cultural, and political issues in the Arab world.
- c. Learning about the historical and political backgrounds of major Arabic movies.
- d. Developing research skills.

Course Policies and Requirements

Language:

 You are expected to speak only in Arabic from the time you enter the classroom including when you chat with your classmates before class officially starts and when working in groups. If you need to speak in English, please ask permission first.

Academic Honesty:

- Do your own work. It is against the policy of this course to use an answer key or Google
 <u>Translate</u>, to enlist the help of a fluent Arabic speaker or to have your work checked by
 anyone other than your instructors before submitting it.
- Working on the homework with other classmates is allowed, but each student must submit to the instructor his or her own answers.

Homework:

 Assigned homework will be posted on Canvas and, unless otherwise noted, must be submitted at the beginning of the following session.

Class conduct:

- It is expected in Arab culture to greet others upon entering a room, so remember to greet the instructors and your classmates when you enter class.
- Eating or chewing gum is not allowed, but feel free to bring coffee, water or soft drinks to class.
- Please keep your cell phones in silent mode <u>and</u> in your backpacks.

Canvas and E-mail:

This class relies heavily on Canvas where grades and assignments will be regularly posted. Be sure to check Canvas and your email daily as the instructor will share important information pertaining to class over the email.

Grade Distribution

Attendance, Participation and Preparation (20%)

- This is a student centered class, so you are expected to attend all classes and to show up to class well prepared. Your daily attendance and participation grade will be on a scale from 1 to 5. It will be posted on canvas after each class, so make sure to check Canvas daily to see how well you are doing.
- Most of class time will be devoted to activities in a collaborative format. To
 participate actively, you need to prepare well before class. If for any reason, you
 have been unable to prepare for class adequately, make sure to inform your
 instructor beforehand and s/he can arrange for you to learn by listening that day.
- In case of absence, please inform your instructor **before not after the class you will be missing**. The grade for that day's participation will be "0." The lowest 2 grades for attendance and participation will not be counted when calculating the final grade at the end of the semester.
- Students are responsible for any class work, homework and for any announcement made during their absence.
- Attendance and participation grades will be deducted for tardiness as follows: arrival during first 5 mins. of class = 1 Pt.

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during first 10 mins. = 2 Pts.
during first 15 mins. = 3 Pts.
during first 20 mins. = 4 Pts
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If you arrive more than 20 mins. late for class you will receive a "0" for that day's class participation

Homework Assignments and vocabulary lists (20%)

 Expect to spend a minimum of 2.5 - 3 hours of homework in preparation for every class session (excluding time spent watching movies). Homework assignments must be turned in at the beginning of every class, and late homework assignments will not be accepted unless you have received an approval from the instructor prior to the assignment's due date. The lowest 2 grades for homework are not counted toward your final grade.

- Homework must be double spaced, and sheets of papers must be stapled.
 Make sure you write your name and the homework number. Points will be deducted when submitted work does not follow any of those guidelines.
- Homework assignments will be graded on a scale from 1 to 5. You will be graded on the overall quality of your work, and on the effort you put into the homework and not on the number of incorrect answers.
- Make sure you write your homework assignment in full sentences for fill-in-the blank exercises. You will not receive credit for the exercise when you submit just a list of words rather than full sentences.
- Each student will be working on a vocabulary list on google doc where new words or expressions are added throughout the semester. To add the google doc link, please go to discussions on Canvas and click on "قائمة بالمفردات الجديدة" and then hit reply. After adding the subject (which must include your name)t, click on the "Link to URL" icon (it looks a little like an attachment), and then add the URL of your google doc. Once you add the URL, please check that the hyperlink is working. Also make sure that you enable viewers of your google doc to make edits.
- Vocabulary lists must include words or expressions that you believe are important to understand the movies or the readings and that will help you write about the movies. You are expected to study and use these words and expressions in your blog entries and in class discussions; they will be included in the quizzes.
 - o For nouns, please provide the singular and the plural forms.
 - o For verbs, please list the past, the present and the gerund (MaSdar) forms and the preposition when necessary. Pay attention to MaSdar patterns as you will need to list the verb in the past and the present along with the MaSdar.

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• The daily schedule will inform you of due dates for the vocabulary lists.

Tests (20%)

• Tests may include writing and listening components in addition to grammar and vocabulary. Dates for the tests will be announced at least one week in advance.

Blog entries (20%)

The purpose of the blog entries is to reflect on the movies as well as to activate
the vocabulary and grammatical structures you have learnt. Writing is a very
effective way to help in retention of new vocabulary, so remember that you are
expected to use vocabulary you have included in your google doc vocabulary list.

• Throughout the semester, you will write 4 blog entries. Each blog entry will consist of 300 to 350 words in Arabic; it must be posted under discussions on Canvas, and print out must be submitted in class. Your entry must include words and expressions we have studied in the course and three of the following: 1) a summary of the plot and theme(s) of the movie, 2) your reaction/ point of view, 3) a comparison to other movies we've watched in class or readings we've done for this class, 4) a comparison to other movies you've watched in other languages.

Final Written project (20 %)

- The final written project is approximately 1250 words long and will explore one aspect of Arabic cinema. You may choose to focus on films by a certain director, cinema in a particular Arab country, or a specific social, political or historical aspect analyzed in movies we've watched.
- The paper must be typed and will require research and a bibliography. It is due on December 11th.
