Course Description

This course will explore Arab modern histories and cultures through the lens of film and music. Students will examine the roots of some of the most prominent social, cultural, political, and gendered norms often attributed to the Arab World. Diverse materials from across the region will help students move past any misconceptions of uniformity in the Arab world. From Saudi Arabia, Lebanon, to Egypt and beyond, students will enhance their global competencies and reflect upon the varied life experiences of people from around the Arab World.

Course Structure

The class will be meeting synchronously via zoom twice a week. Students are required to watch films (and in a few instances, read articles) prior to class.

Prerequisite

There are no prerequisites for this course. No knowledge of Arabic is required as all the movies will have English subtitles. Also, no knowledge of music is required.

Required Texts

There are no required texts for this course. Supplemental readings and links to movies, songs, and websites will be on Canvas. Students are required to watch the movies outside of class.

Grade Distribution

Attendance, Participation and Preparation (25%)

I look forward to you being in class on time and well-prepared (i.e., having watched the assigned film for the week). Daily attendance and participation are graded on a scale of 1 to 5, and will be posted on Canvas after every class.

- This is a student-centered class, so most of the class time will be discussions and activities in a
 collaborative format. To participate actively, you need to watch the required movie before class.
 If for any reason, you have been unable to prepare for class adequately, make sure to inform
 your instructor beforehand.
- In case of an absence, please inform your instructor **before and not after the class you will be missing**. The grade for that day's participation will be a "0." The lowest two grades for attendance and participation will not be counted when calculating the final grade at the end of the semester.
- Students are responsible for any class work and for any announcement made during their absence.

To get a full participation score, you need to:

- Join the zoom classroom a couple of minutes prior to class and have the camera on
 - Attendance and participation points will be deducted for tardiness as follows:
 - Arrival during the first 5 min of class = 1 pt.
 - Arrival during the first 15 min of class = 2 pts.
 - Arrival during the first 30 min of class = 3 pts.
 - Arrival during the first 40 min of class = 4 pts.
 - If you arrive more than 40 minutes late, you will receive a "0" for that day's participation.

- Camera policy: I believe that the class feels more personal if we can see each other. If, however, you feel uncomfortable having your camera on, please inform the instructor before class. There is no need to explain the reasons behind your decision.
- Be fully prepared for class activities, and participate actively in class and group activities during zoom synchronous meetings. Two points on attendance and participation points will be deducted for being unable to participate in discussions in a meaningful way because of not having watched the film being discussed in class.

Quizzes (25%)

- A short quiz will be given at the beginning of each session when watching a new movie has been assigned in preparation for class.
- The Lowest quiz grade will be dropped.

Midterm (10%)

The midterm will cover films and readings discussed from the beginning of the semester until
the midterm. It consists of a short essay that will demonstrate your understanding of the movies
discussed.

Presenting a movie and leading class discussion (20 %)

- The assignment involves research, collaboration and presentation. You will work on this assignment in pairs and both students will receive the same grade.
- Details and rubric will be shared on Canvas

Final research paper (20 %)

• The final research paper must be a minimum of 5 double spaced pages (font 12) in which students will examine a prominent social, cultural, or political issue reflected upon in one or several of Arab movies. It will require research and a bibliography.
