Course Description

- PSYC 3100 is an overview course examining the study of behavior and mental processes, including research methods, social behavior, motivation, personality, culture, gender, & individual differences. At the conclusion of this course, you will have a better sense of the variety of research subsumed under the title "social psychology". As an overview course, we will cover a great deal of information very rapidly. I hope you find this introduction to the science of social psychology both challenging and interesting. Be aware that this course covers violent topics such as discrimination, intimacy, aggression, violence, and questionable ethics. Review the course calendar to see the topic for each week. **If you are unable to engage with any of these topics, I kindly request that you do what's best for your wellness and drop this course.** Students who stay enrolled are expected to engage with the material each week and complete assessments that demonstrate understanding and application.

Course Learning Objectives (C.L.Os):

1. Critique social psychological science
2. Compare and contrast social psychological theories
3. Exercise critical thinking by creating and answering scientifically-based questions
4. Apply your own experiences and observations to social psychological principles
5. Recognize and respect the value of diverse perspectives and experiences
6. Develop professional communication skills

What to do if Canvas fails

ASSESSMENTS AND GRADING

All assignments are due as scheduled in the course calendar.

Individual Activities – Video Activities and Polls

Individual activities will be provided via Canvas and Vantage as either video activities or polls that you complete by yourself. They are intended to provide you with insight about your own unique perspectives and understanding toward social psychology. There are a total of 10 video assignments that are required (see syllabus schedule below). There are 12 polling activities to choose from, where you can complete 10 polling activities worth 2 points of extra credit each. I will only accept 10 polls, so if you do any extra polls those will not count towards your allotted extra credit points.

Discussion Boards

Discussion boards (DB) will have two different due dates, each with their own points. Part I is worth 50 points, and part II is worth 50 points, for a total of 100 points per discussion board assignment. You cannot engage in Part II without completing Part I. Importantly, we will only grade your first submission for Part I. This means that if you submit a blank response to Part I so that you can see Part II, you will earn a zero for Part I and Part II of that discussion board assignment. Pay close attention to Part I and Part II due dates, and program them into your personal calendar. No artificial intelligence may be used to complete your discussion posts, and if you are found to be using AI your grade will be changed to a zero and a report to the Dean of Student’s office will be made.

Exams & Chapter Quizzes

There will be individual tests and individual reading quizzes during the course of the semester. The exams and quizzes will be handled on Canvas. Individual tests and quizzes will be based on lecture material, assigned media, and assigned readings.

Exams

You are required to take 5 exams. These exams will be taken on Canvas. Exams will consist of approximately 55 multiple choice questions, each worth 2 points. The exam will be counted out of a possible 100 points, but you can score more than 100 points. In other words, each test will have at least 10 bonus points available. You should expect most of the questions to be “application.” That is, most questions will have an example of a concept, and ask you to identify the example (in contrast to having you identify a definition.) You will have 1 hour and 15 minutes to take each exam. Most students will not need the entire time. Questions will appear one-at-a-time, with only forward progression allowed, so you must answer the question on the screen as it is presented. Exams are due by 11:59 PM Central on the date listed in the Course Calendar. **Keep in mind that I do not use percentages to calculate your grades. Therefore, if you earn an 88/110 on your exam, then you earn 88 points and not an 80%.** Exams are open book and notes. They are NOT open Internet (i.e., no Artificial Intelligence may be used), and any student caught cheating will be subject to the Professional Conduct Policy described below. I highly recommend that you **NOT use your phone or tablet to take an exam.** The Canvas app frequently fails, so if you think you can successfully take a quiz while away from a computer, you have been warned that I will not let you re-take it and your grade will stay as is.

Missed Exams

I do not allow late work or makeups. If you miss an exam, you will earn an automatic zero, and will not be able to make up the exam. Emails requesting me to allow make-ups will not be replied to, as the answer will be no. So, please plan accordingly.

Chapter Quizzes

Chapter Quizzes are individual assignments and will cover the materials specified in this syllabus. Each quiz is worth 15 points and may be accessed via Vantage through Canvas. I highly recommend that you **NOT use your phone or tablet to take a quiz.** The Canvas app frequently fails, so if you think you can successfully take a quiz while away from a computer, you have been warned that I will not let you re-take it and your grade will stay as is.

- Quizzes will have a time limit, so completing the quiz while looking up the answers for every question will be impossible.
- I highly suggest that you read the assigned pages for the designated quiz before you take it. The quizzes can be accessed by clicking on the Vantage link in the Canvas module.
- Once the due date has passed for the quiz, it will be removed from Canvas. I will not allow any student to take a late quiz! Therefore, **be mindful of the quiz due dates located in your syllabus.**

Checking Your Grade

You can check your earned points anytime in Canvas by clicking on the “Grades” button. Be careful! I use a point system, and offer more opportunities to earn those points than necessary. Importantly, this means that your grade percentage shown in Canvas will be incorrect. **Therefore, attend to the number of points you earn since your final grade will be based on those total points, and where they fall on the grading scale located below.**

Grade Disputes

You have 2 business days to dispute a graded assignment from the time it has been entered into Canvas. Once 2 days have passed, the dispute resolution window has closed. Therefore, if I accidentally missed one of your assignments, or did not enter the right grade, or you feel like you provided a response that should get you more points, tell me within 2 business days so I can fix it!

ASSIGNMENT AND GRADING RULES

1. No extensions will be allowed on assignments, and no late work will be accepted. Every student should plan to follow the course assignment schedule and complete assignments on time, as outlined in the course syllabus and Canvas.
 - a. If you are travelling the day an assignment is due, please be mindful of any time differences across locations (change in time zones) and plan accordingly. I will not consider this as a reason for lack of timely assignment submission and you will earn a zero for failure to complete the assignment on time.
2. Grades will not be rounded for this course. If you earn 707 points, that is an F and will not be rounded to a D, no exceptions. Any emails requesting this will not be answered.
3. You must purchase the Vantage Digital Text in order to complete assignments for this class. While you will be able to use a free trial for the first three chapters of assignments, you will not be able to use the trial for the remainder of the chapter assignments. The expectation of this class is that you purchase the Vantage Digital Text as soon as possible, and importantly, you cannot pass the course without it. So, if you email me about not being able to purchase the text

in time for when assignments are due, I will not respond to that email.

4. A note about Artificial Intelligence (AI) use: According to UNT Student Academic Integrity Policy (UNT Policy 6.003), “The “unauthorized” use of any person or technology that assists in a student’s assignment, project, or paper is considered cheating...Unless a professor or instructor gives explicit “authorization,” AI cannot be used to complete assignments, projects, or papers. Doing so will result in a “cheating” violation.” For this course, you are not permitted to use any AI platform (e.g., ChatGPT, Grammarly, etc.) to help you complete any assignment for this class. UNT POLICIES

Academic Integrity Policy

Academic Integrity Standards and Consequences. According to UNT Policy 06.003, Student Academic Integrity, academic dishonesty occurs when students engage in behaviors including, but not limited to cheating, fabrication, facilitating academic dishonesty, forgery, plagiarism, and sabotage. A finding of academic dishonesty may result in a range of academic penalties or sanctions ranging from admonition to expulsion from the University.

Attendance, Illness, Withdrawal, and Incomplete Coursework

If you miss more than three weeks of class, you need to schedule a meeting with me to discuss steps to take to withdraw from the course or receive an [Incomplete grade](#). A grade of Incomplete is only an option if you meet [university and departmental guidelines](#), including the completion of at least 60% of the course assignments and performance equivalent to a C or better when the Incomplete is requested. A grade of Incomplete is not to be used to extend due dates to help boost your current grade, serve as an alternative to a Course Withdrawal, or to provide additional time to complete coursework that you could have completed with

proper time management. If you do not meet the requirements for an Incomplete grade, you may meet the requirements for [a Late Course Withdrawal](#) due to medical or personal reasons beyond your control. If you believe the final grade submitted to the UNT system is not reflective of your performance, you can begin

- an error was made in calculating the grade, including failure to factor an assignment, project, quiz, or examination.

If the student believes that the grade was assigned due to discrimination or sexual harassment, the student must report this belief to the Office of Equal Opportunity.
