

PSYC 4610.001 Abnormal Psychology Fall 2023 (TR, 12:30-1:50 in GAB 105)

Course description:

This course is designed to provide an introductory understanding of the topics and issues relevant to the area of abnormal psychology with an emphasis on the classification, conceptualization, and treatment of individuals with mental disorders. The course format will include lectures and class discussion. To successfully complete the course you will have to be alert, take useful notes, and read the assigned material before class.

Course catalog description:

4610. Abnormal Psychology. 3 hours. Major psychoses, neuroses and other types of maladaptive behavior patterns that are common problems in society; descriptions of symptomatology, theoretical approaches and epidemiological variables. Prerequisite(s): Junior standing.

Exams & grades and assessment of your performance:

There will be 3 multiple-choice exams (each worth 50 points). Each exam will cover the prior weeks' readings and lectures. Thus, exams will not be comprehensive and will only cover the relevant chapters listed on the schedule below. There may be up to 5 points of additional bonus questions on each exam that would not count against your total score of 50 if missed, but may give you up to 5 additional points.

Grades will be computed in the following manner:

If there is a known conflict with the scheduled exam dates (e.g. religious holiday, etc.), please notify the instructor immediately so that accommodations can be made. If you provide at least 2 weeks advance notice that you need to miss an exam for an excused reason (e.g. athletics), you will be allowed to take the exam at a prearranged time; however, you must notify the instructor and arrange for this ahead of the exam. Otherwise, make-up exams will only be given upon verification of justifiable absences (e.g., written doctors excuse for medical illness, certificate of death in the family). Make-up exams may be in essay format to assess knowledge of the material while preventing redundancy with discussion about the exam in class. Students who are failing the course after Exam 3 will be given the opportunity to take at least one make-up essay exam to replace one of their failing exam grades, but only one exam at maximum can be replaced (this is only if the cumulative total of exam scores is below 90 at the end of the semester).
