Course description-

This course is designed to provide an introductory understanding of the topics and issues relevant to the area of psychopsychology with an emphasis on the classification, conceptualization, and treatment of individuals with mental disorders. The course format is face-to-face lectures. To successfully complete this course, you should be engaged--read the assigned material before attending class lectures, take useful notes.

Exams & grades: There will be 2 multiple-choice CANVAS exams (each worth 75 points). Each exam will only cover the prior weeks' lectures. Thus, exams will not be comprehensive, only covering specific chapters listed on the schedule. Make-up exams will only be given upon verification of justifiable absences (e.g., written doctors excuse for medical illness, certificate of death in the family).
