German 3056: German Novella Spring 2024

Instructor: Dr. Carol Anne Costabile-Heming (she/her)

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Class meets: MW 3:30-4:50 pm (LANG 104)

Course Description: This course presents an overview of major literary movements and authors from the 19th and early 20th centuries. For the purposes of this course, students will focus on the genre Novelle.

Course Prerequisite: Successful completion of GERM 2050 or equivalent.

Course Objectives: By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Understand the history and theory of the novella in Germany
- Understand major literary movements of the 19th and early 20th centuries
- Be able to read literary texts of varying lengths
- Be able to write short interpretations of literary texts

Required Text: *An Anthology of German Novellas*. Edited by Siegfried Weing. Rochester: Camden House, 1996. ISBN: 1-57113-097-7.

You can purchase either a print or digital a copy of the book from the UNT Bookstore. A print copy of the book is on 2-hour reserve at Willis Library. In addition, you can view an EBook through Willis Library (https://discover.library.unt.edu/catalog/b6562517). We will read 9 stories from the textbook. I encourage you to choose the textbook option that fits best with your learning style and your budget.

COURSE COMPONENTS:

I. Active class participation: Students are expected to participate actively in class discussions in German and to prepare the readings, and written assignments prior to each class. This outside of class work is essential for our in-class work and discussions. Students are responsible for all material covered in class.

Active class participation will be graded 0, 1, 2, 3 (with 3 being the highest):

- 3: A score of 3 indicates that the student attended the entire class meeting, participated actively in classroom activities, which includes contributing to discussions thoughtfully, remaining on topic, preparing questions for discussion, actively engaging with collaborative learning tools used in class.
- 2: A score of 2 indicates that the student did not attend the entire class meeting or participated in some classroom activities, but did not fulfil one of the requirements for a score of 3.
- 1: A score of 1 indicates that students attended the class but did not participate in classroom activities.

0: A score of 0 indicates that the student did not attend class and did not contact the instructor prior to class. Excused absences will be marked as "excused" in Canvas.

II. Homework: Homework will consist of a variety of assignments such as worksheets, collaborative reading assignments, Jamboard tasks, short quizzes. Submit assignments in the specified format in Canvas by the deadline, which will be **prior to the start of class**. Some assignments may have staggered deadlines; all parts of the assignment must be completed by the specified deadlines in order for the assignment to be considered **complete**.

Assignments are assessed as **Complete/Incomplete** in Canvas.

- There is no partial credit: either an assignment meets the goals or it does not.
- Assignments will specify the requirements necessary to be considered **complete**.
- **Complete** is not a minimum expectation. It indicates that you have achieved the assignment's learning goals and met the specifications.
- Students should utilize any recommended resources to assist them in completing assignments.

Spelling, grammar, punctuation:

- Use German capitalization, spelling and punctuation. Write complete sentences and use correct grammar to the greatest extent possible.
- Proof read, use spellcheckers and grammar checkers (available in both languages) prior to submitting.
- Assignments containing excessive errors in spelling, punctuation, and grammar will be considered **incomplete**.

Extensions and Revisions

- Students can request up to 4 homework deadline extensions and up to 2 requests to submit revisions.
- Revisions requests will not be granted for assignments considered not complete because of excessive spelling, grammar, and punctuation errors.
- III. Short papers: Students will write short analytical and interpretive papers about 3 of the texts discussed in class. Each paper will be approximately two pages in length, typed, double-spaced, and in German. These papers will be due following the final discussion of the text.

All students will write papers on the Tieck text (due Feb. 12). The remaining two papers may be chosen from the other texts discussed in class. Tentatively, we will read a total of eight texts, but the syllabus is only an approximation, and students should not wait until the very last texts to write papers. It is your responsibility to ensure that you write a total of 3 papers. The papers will be graded on a scale of 1, 2, 3 (with 3 being the highest). The requirements for each paper will be specified in the assignment details in Canvas.

IV. Final Paper: Students will write a 4-page paper choosing from a series of options. The paper will be graded on a scale of 1, 2, 3 (with 3 being the highest). Specifics will be detailed in Canvas.

GRADING SYSTEM: The course grade reflects the assignments and requirements that students have satisfactorily accomplished in the class. You should strive to complete the assignment bundle that corresponds to the letter grade you wish to earn in this class. This approach allows you to control what you will strive for based on your priorities, interests, time management abilities, and intellectual goals. In

order to earn a specific grade, all assignments in the bundle need to be achieved.

General course and university guidelines

Canvas: All course assignments and secondary materials will be posted on the course Canvas site.

Communication Expectations: The instructor communicates with students through Canvas Announcements and through UNT e-mail. All e-mail is sent to students' UNT e-mail accounts.
