REQUIRED COURSE MATERIAL: All materials will be available in Canvas. Students are expected to bring a WIFI enabled device (laptop, tablet, mobile phone) to each class.

<u>ACCESSING FILMS</u>: Films available via streaming services are noted on the syllabus and students are required to view them prior to class.

Content Note: Some of the material that we will cover in class may be upsetting or disturbing, as it can deal with issues of racism, sexism, violence, suicide, contain loud noises, nudity, sexual content, among others. Learning takes place when we grapple with challenging ideas, concepts and perspectives, and this process not infrequently involves exposure to distressing facts and events. I am mindful of the varied responses that this subject matter can evoke in students. Please feel free to talk to me privately if you believe you will have problems engaging with texts or films that represent any of these issues, and I can help you navigate them. If you ever feel the need to step outside during one of these discussions, you may always do so without academic penalty. (You will, however, be responsible for any material you miss. If you do leave the room for a significant time, please plan to get notes from another student or see me individually.)

<u>ADDITIONAL ELECTRONIC RESOURCES</u>: These electronic resources provide information about films, directors, cast, crew, as well as historical information. These resources should be consulted to complete homework assignments and to conduct research.

<u>COURSE PREREQUISITE:</u> The prerequisite for this course is the successful completion of **3 hours of advanced German** or German 2050 or the equivalent and permission from the Department.

<u>COURSE DESCRIPTION:</u> This course explores German-language films, television series, and streaming media series, that present fictional and semi-fictional accounts of important moments in German history

including representations of the Weimar Republic, Nazi Germany, the challenges experienced by divided Germany.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES: 1

- Acquire German-language film-related vocabulary
- Knowledge of German film and television productions
- Understand the distinguishing features of documentary and feature films
- Recognize differences between US and German approaches to German history
- Analyze critically secondary literature on film
- Analyze critically key moment of German history and their cultural representation

COURSE COMPONENTS:

I. Active class participation: Students are expected to participate actively in class discussions in German, and to view the films (unless specified on the syllabus that there will be an in-class screening), prepare the readings, and written assignments prior to each class. This outside of class work is essential for our in-class work and discussions. Students are responsible for all material covered in class.

Active class participation will be graded 0, 1, 2, 3 (with 3 being the highest):

- 3: A score of 3 indicates that the student attended the entire class meeting, participated actively in classroom activities, which includes contributing to discussions thoughtfully, remaining on topic, preparing questions for discussion, actively engaging with collaborative learning tools used in class.
- 2: A score of 2 indicates that the student did not attend the entire class meeting or participated in some classroom activities, but did not fulfil one of the requirements for a score of 3.
- 1: A score of 1 indicates that students attended the class but did not participate in classroom activities.
- **0:** A score of 0 indicates that the student did not attend class and did not contact the instructor prior to class. Excused absences will be marked as "excused" in Canvas.
- **II. Homework:** Homework will consist of a variety of assignments such as worksheets, collaborative reading assignments, Jamboard tasks, etc. Submit assignments in the specified format in Canvas by the deadline, which will be **prior to the start of class**. Some assignments have staggered deadlines; all parts of the assignment must be completed by the specified deadlines in order for the assignment to be considered **complete**.

Assignments are assessed as **Complete/Incomplete** in Canvas.

- There is no partial credit: either an assignment meets the goals or it does not.
- Assignments will specify the requirements necessary to be considered **complete**.
- Complete is not a minimum expectation. It indicates that you have achieved the assignment's learning goals and met the specifications.
- Students should utilize the recommended resources to assist them in completing assignments.

Spelling, grammar, punctuation:

• Assignments in German: Use German capitalization, spelling and punctuation. Write complete sentences and use correct grammar to the greatest extent possible.

- Assignments in English: Use US English capitalization, spelling and punctuation. Write complete sentences and use correct grammar to the greatest extent possible.
- Proof read, use spellcheckers and grammar checkers (available in both languages) prior to submitting.
- Assignments containing excessive errors in spelling, punctuation, and grammar will be considered **incomplete**.

Extensions and Revisions

- Students can request up to 2 homework deadline extensions and up to 2 requests to submit revisions.
- Revisions requests will not be granted for assignments considered not complete because of excessive spelling, grammar, and punctuation errors.

III. Research Project: Students will write a 5-page paper in German on one of the films/series viewed in class or another available film of their choice (in consultation with the instructor), and they will also present their project to the class during the scheduled final exam period. The research project should attempt to offer an original contribution to the understanding of the portrayal of historical events in German-language film and television. The research project has 6 specific components. Each component will be graded on a scale of 1, 2, 3 (with 3 being the highest). The specific requirements for each component will be specified in the assignment details in Canvas.

Project Components and Deadlines

- **Project Proposal:** write a 250-word proposal in German that describes the film and topic they wish to write about. Be careful to choose a topic that is narrow and can be discussed thoroughly in 5 pages. **Due: September 13.**
- **Project Outline:** Draft an outline, mind map, or sketch of the project in German that provides details about specific scenes to be analyzed, theoretical framework, film techniques to be discussed that can serve as a roadmap for drafting the paper. **Due: October 4.**
- Annotated Bibliography: Prepare an annotated bibliography offering full bibliographical information and summary/description of contents of at least two (2) articles, books, or book chapters directly relevant to the project defined in the proposal. The summary/description may be written in English. The bibliography should conform to MLA style. **Due: October 11.**
- Complete First Draft: Submit a complete first draft of the paper. The instructor will return the drafts with corrections and suggestions for revisions. Due: November 15.
- **Final Project:** Prepare a final draft by December 6, the final day of class. Address the corrections and suggestions made by the instructor. The final version of the paper must include the full text of the paper, including a list of all works cited (NOT an annotated bibliography), and all relevant endnotes. **Due: December 6.**
- **Research Presentation:** Prepare a presentation (6-7 minutes) about the research project for presentation during the regularly scheduled final exam meeting on **December 13 at 4 pm**.

<u>GRADING SYSTEM</u>: The course grade reflects the assignments and requirements that students have satisfactorily accomplished in the class. You should strive to complete the assignment bundle that corresponds to the letter grade you wish to earn in this class. This approach allows you to control what you will strive for based on your priorities, interests, time management abilities, and intellectual goals. In order to earn a specific grade, **all assignments in the bundle need to be achieved**. Failure to

complete **all** components of the research project by the specified deadlines lowers the course grade by one letter automatically.

Canvas: All course assignments, links to streaming films, and secondary materials will be posted on the course Canvas site.

Communication Expectations: The instructor communicates with students through Canvas Announcements and through UNT e-mail. All e-mail is sent to students' UNT e-mail accounts. It is the students' responsibility to check UNT e-mail regularly or have UNT e-mail forwarded to another
