Course Description

Spanish 3002 is an advanced conversation course for native speakers of Spanish who have successfully completed SPAN 2050 or its equivalent. This course will expand your vocabulary and improve your ability to read, comprehend, listen, and discuss a broad variety of topics in Spanish. Upon completion of this course, students will be able to discuss events, present detailed arguments, summarize information and be able to explore and debate current cultural, social and political topics of importance to local and international communities. A variety of activities will foster progress in Spanish language oral communication skills, and support linguistic challenges specific to native or heritage speakers of Spanish.

Course Prerequisites

This course is designed for students that have completed Spanish 2050 at UNT or the equivalent. Students must know basic grammatical structures (e.g. verbal tenses, subjunctive mood, object pronouns, etc.) in order to take this course. This course is designed for heritage speakers.

Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, learners will be able to:

1. Demonstrate oral proficiency appropriate to third-year students
2. Demonstrate fluency and the ability to summarize information, present arguments, persuade, analyze, and interpret the opinions of others at a level appropriate to third-year students
3. Demonstrate vocabulary and grammar necessary to support and facilitate in-depth conversation and expression of opinions at a level appropriate to third-year students
4. Demonstrate the ability to present arguments, persuade, analyze, and interpret the opinions of others at a level appropriate to third-year students
5. Expand the linguistic repertoire to encompass academic and professional expression
6. Develop cultural awareness of the Spanish-speaking world appropriate to third-year students

COURSE POLICIES

Participation

To achieve the highest possible personal level of proficiency in Spanish and to be successful in this course, it is necessary to come to each class focused on that goal. Students who perform the five basic tasks listed in the rubric below will be well on their way to being successful in communicating in Spanish. Additionally, students will see these efforts recognized and rewarded; class participation is a substantial portion of the course grade. Please note students must perform **all** five tasks listed in the rubric below to receive participation points. Students not meeting expectations for all five tasks listed in the rubric below will receive a zero (verbal/written warnings and reduced points may also be assigned according to the policy of the instructor).

Attendance

After the 4th absence, whether excused or unexcused, one percentage point (1%) per absence will be deducted from the student's final course grade.

Generative AI

In principle you may use material derived from AI-generated content. This includes, for example, drafting an outline, preparing individual sections, combining elements, removing redundant parts, and compiling and annotating references.

However, this is a conversations class, and your speaking skills (vocabulary, pronunciation, and fluency) are fundamental to passing this class.

1. To pass this course: AI generated submissions cannot achieve a passing grade. This is necessary to ensure you are competent to surpass generative AI in the future – whether in academia, research, the workplace, or other domains of society.
2. Attribution: You are taking full responsibility for AI-generated materials as if you had produced them yourself: ideas must be attributed, and facts must be true.

Oral Tasks

Students will complete three oral presentations in class. The presentations will be given during class time and will focus on a topic related to the themes, conversations, and grammar covered in class. The presentations must not be read and must meet the time requirements. Practice ahead of time. If using a PowerPoint presentation, students will be allowed slides only with photos and no more than 10 words, in Spanish, on the slide. The grading rubrics for assessment of oral skills and any additional instructions will be posted to Canvas. Students will be graded on their 1) organization, 2) content, 3) grammar, 4) pronunciation, and 5) fluidity.
