# Collection Development and Analysis in School Libraries Fall 2025 – Debbie Knight

# **Course Description**

The course covers the principles and recommended methods used by school librarians to evaluate, select, purchase and maintain a school library collection. It includes the study of selection policies, selection tools, vendors and publishers, collection analysis, de-selection of materials, and intellectual freedom.

## **Course Goals**

- To review resources used to evaluate, select and acquire library materials.
- To understand the function of a materials selection policy in the school library.

- To explore the overlapping issues of censorship, intellectual freedom and collection development in a youth collection.
- To explore the impact of electronic resources on school library collections.
- To understand the purpose and limitations of book reviews in the library selection process.
- To examine the types of vendors and vendor services usually offered to school libraries.
- To review accepted procedures for de-selecting (weeding) library materials.

# **Learning Objectives**

Assignment Objective: Discussion Boards

At the conclusion of the course, students will be able to identify, define, and discuss, verbally and in writing, important topics in the area of Collection Development including the following:

- o Importance of and how to write a mission statement
- o Reasons to have a collection policy
- o Balancing issues of literary merit versus popularity in buying books
- Issues with special formats in collection such as periodicals, eBooks, video, and audio recordings
- o Practice using electronic collection development service products
- o Collaboration between librarians and teachers
- Collection mapping
- Weeding and the CREW method
- Intellectual freedom issues
- o Privacy of patrons issues
- Labeling and rating systems for books
- o Incorporating Makerspaces in the school library curriculum
- Mastery of these objectives will be measured by a score of 80% on discussion board entries based on the grading rubrics provided for those assignments.

Assignment Objective: Formal Observation Module/Lesson Plan/Recorded Lesson

Students will plan and present a lesson about a school library topic of importance. Students must examine and evaluate Texas State Library Standards, choose key standards, and design a lesson to demonstrate mastery of the standards chosen by K-12 students of teachers. Students will be assessed using a rubric to determine completeness, accuracy, and quality of their lesson and the recording of that lesson. A score of 80% or higher on the pre-conference, lesson plan, video recording of the lesson, and post-conference will convey mastery of the objective.

Assignment Objective: Collection Development Policy

Students will create a collection development policy and procedures manual in modules 3-7. The manual will include an in-depth analysis of the needs of a library collection included what actions a librarian should take to maintain the library and its materials. The assignment will be completed in 5 phases with each phase being worth 100 points. A grading rubric will be used to determine mastery of the objective. A score of 80/100 or higher will demonstrate mastery.

## **Course Requirements**


The course is divided into 7 content modules. Please see "Modules" on the menu on the left. Each module contains background material to familiarize you with the topic, textbook readings, supplemental reading assignments, and videos.

The modules may include quizzes, discussion board posts/responses, and video-style posts/responses, and assignments to help you reflect on the material covered in the required readings.

There is a chart below this syllabus which provides a schedule of the modules with due dates.

## **Grades & Feedback:**

All assignments will be assessed using rubrics. Most assignments are followed by the rubric. For some discussion boards, the rubric may not show up automatically. If a rubric is not able to be viewed, please click on the box with the three vertical dots in the horizontal box just above the particular assignment's instructions to see the rubric. For most assignments, you can expect to receive a grade within one week or sooner, following the due date. The grades and written feedback will be provided in Canvas. For the lesson & lesson recording assignments, you will receive feedback from your field supervisor. Our field supervisor is a practicing librarian hired by the University of North Texas to assess your lessons on paper and later that same field supervisor will watch you actually present the lesson with students or classmates through a recording.

## **Documenting Sources**

APA is the accepted style for creating citations and references in all LIS courses. Document all sources for all assignments in correct APA format unless instructions indicate otherwise. For proper citation style, please refer to the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association: Sixth Edition, published in October 2019. The following online sources are also excellent for providing examples of APA style with clear directions for its use.

- Citation Builder
- <u>DOI finder</u>: -use this to identify the DOI (Digital Object Identifier) for articles.

Each written assignment and video presentation is expected to follow the APA 7th edition format, double-spaced and all references should be cited. All papers should be submitted in MS Word (.doc) format or as a PDF document. All writing is expected to be of graduate level quality in both content and written expression. Poor writing, grammar, spelling, or other mechanical deficiencies will detract from the score.

## **Late Projects and Assignments**

The late policies in this course are standard for school library certification courses. Be sure that you record the due dates and complete your work on time. Penalties are assessed for late work as follows:

- o Assignments posted late will be lowered by three points for each day late.

# IMPORTANT: Requirements to be a Certified School Librarian

UNT's school library certification program adheres to the rules set forth in the Texas Administrative Code, which governs educator preparation and certification. To be approved for certification through the Texas Education Agency, upon completing the MLIS or certification courses, Texas students must apply for school librarian certification.

In addition to completing the required certification courses, you will be required to provide evidence of the following to become a certified school librarian:

- 1. Two years as an early childhood-12th-grade classroom teacher in a public or accredited private school.
- 2. A Master's Degree (in most any area).
- 3. Completion of a state-approved program in librarianship (courses taken from the prescribed list must be no more than six years old when the application is made for school library certification).
- 4. A passing score on the TExES School Librarianship exam (exam administered by the state).

Out of state students must meet certification requirements for their state; a passing score on the Texas state certification exam is waived for out of state students but all other requirements for Practicum must be met.
