COURSE DESCRIPTION AND GOALS

The Voice class for Music Majors is based on C. Vaughn and M. Dayme's text *The Singing Book* and seeks to teach the fundamentals of correct breathing, tone production, diction, methods of and basic fundamental vocal pedagogy, and experience in classical vocal repertoire.

Upon completion of the course, Students will:

- Gain knowledge of the vocal apparatus and physical anatomy
- Understand methods of healthy and sustainable vocal production and expression in both performance and daily life
- Gain confidence and experience in group and solo singing and performance

PHYSICAL CONTACT

As a rule, NO PHYSICAL CONTACT between students or the Instructor unless otherwise touching becomes a more efficient way to demonstrate technical issues, which will always be preceded with a discussion of consent. I will always ask for your consent, and expect you to ask that of your classmates as well.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance in class is mandatory. You are <u>allowed TWO unexcused absences</u> without a grade reduction. After that, each unexcused absence will lower your grade percentage by half a grade. Unexcused absences of 5 or more may result in automatic failure of the class.

Midterms and Finals are <u>mandatory</u> events. Students who do not attend their Final nor make it up at a later date are liable to fail the entire course, regardless of their current grade.

RECITAL / PERFORMANCE REVIEWS

Students will be required to attend 2 vocal performances through the semester. These may be any UNT Voice, Choral, Opera, Jazz, or Teacher approved event.

Students must provide proof of their attendance through a photo or signed program, as well as a 250 word review about the performance in conjunction with what you have learned so far. There are several performances given every week throughout the semester, so please make sure to check the calendar to find a performance at a good

time for you to complete the assignment. Performances you are a part of are not eligible for this review assignment.

Attending Performances for this assignment will be at the Students' discretion, so these are due by the last day of our class (December 3rd).

MID-TERM and FINAL PERFORMANCE

Students will perform a <u>memorized</u> song of their choice agreed upon by the instructor and the student for both the Midterm and the Final, with a Native and Foreign Language piece respectively.

You are responsible for finding a score and sending it to me beforehand so you have ample time to prepare and learn your piece. Please let me know in advance if you would like to use a pre-recorded accompaniment, or accompany yourself instead of piano accompaniment. If you are in need of a piano accompanist, please talk to me and I will help you find a collaborator.

Students are expected to learn all notes and rhythms, understand the piece's meaning, and be able to comfortably perform the diction and text to the best of their availability and expression.

MASTERCLASSES

Prior to the Midterm and Final, we will hold a Masterclass for all students. Students will perform in front of the class and receive feedback from the instructor and fellow peers. These sessions are not only for you to improve on your singing ability, but also for the class to get an outside view on other's lessons and to take away key points they can use in their own singing.
