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# Course Description

In this class we will study the extraordinary art of 18th Century Music with an emphasis on the music of J. S. Bach. Our study will lead to composition and analysis; you will write very short compositional and analytical studies that embody the general principles under discussion. You will also compose a final project to be discussed in due course. Note: I shall return work handed in at the due date by our next class meeting. All work turned in after the deadline will receive a grade lowered by one letter grade for each day late, unless the student has an excused absence and provides documentation with 48 hours of the missed assignment.

Attendance Policy: each unexcused absence will lower your final grade one point. Absences are excused for all UNT COM activities, emergencies, illnesses, and circumstances beyond your control.

In music, our emphasis will be on the Two-Part Inventions by J. S. Bach; in analysis, our emphasis will be on your Final Projects--a fully-realized two part invention in the style of J. S. Bach. To study both dimensions of the course and its music, we shall work in detail through our text: Robert Gauldin's *A Practical Approach to Eighteenth Century Counterpoint*. # Course Structure

You will do short, written work for 40 of our classes (see "Modules" for details). Work must be handed in produced in MUSESCORE at the beginning of class when due. I will accept late work for official UNT COM activities and for life events that require your attention.

# Course Prerequisites or Other Restrictions

Completion of MUTH 2400 and MUTH 2410 with a grade of C or better In order to be successful in this course you must:

- Devote at least 3 hours of work to the course each day not counting our class meetings.
- Use a robust internet connection and computer to communicate with colleagues as well as study and upload assignments.

# Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of the course, you will have mastered the musical style of 18th Century music through daily analytical and compositional written work focusing on contrapuntal procedures in Bach's Two-Part Inventions.

Our work (both analytical and compositional) will focus on

- the relationship between consonance and dissonance in 18th-Century music, both melodically and harmonically
- sequences (with an emphasis on marking beginning and ending delimiters; the technique of transposition; and (if broken) both where and the musical effect of, the "jumping off" point
- dominant and tonic complexes (understood as supported by simple, underlying prolongation by means of a single bass not (scale degree 5 for the dominant; scale degree 1 for the tonic) supporting more complex surface motions
- how key areas are established and how they relate to one another

There is one required text for the course: Robert Gauldin, *A Practical Approach to 18th-Century Counterpoint*. Revised Edition. (Long Grove, Illinois: Waveland Press, 2013).

I shall return all 2 point daily assignments at the beginning of the next class day. I shall grade your final projects on the day they are due and post the grades the following day.

Please note: do not schedule your end of semester jury against a regularly scheduled class.

# Teaching Philosophy

I believe in making this course interesting, relevant, culturally sensitive to equity and diversity, and thorough in terms of teaching you professional level mastery of the techniques of music analysis.

It is my responsibility to provide you with clear, concise, and competent materials for each day's work within each module; these include pdf scores (where appropriate), videos (that are single shots with no internal editing, perfect audio and visual assets, and captioning), audio and video assets of the relevant works, and perfectly clear written assignments that I will return via Canvas graded with comments within one week of submission.

It is your responsibility to do each day's work thoroughly, to communicate concerns that you have via the Canvas email feature, to participate actively in discussion boards, to submit assignments on time, to consider my written comments on papers, and to respond to them following the return of each written assignment.

- There is a flaw in all six of the above criteria
