Course Syllabus

COURSE DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE

To develop a professional conducting approach with emphasis on techniques appropriate to wind, orchestral, and choral conducting. The course will include instruction in beginning and intermediate conducting techniques, score analysis and preparation, development of visual/aural discrimination skills, the role of the conductor in historical and philosophical perspectives, and a reinforcement of basic musicianship.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

At the conclusion of this course, the student will be able to:

- Demonstrate proper conducting posture
- Demonstrate effective baton technique
- Demonstrate the following techniques:
 - o Preparatory gestures, downbeats, and releases
 - Patterns for various meters, including duple/triple, simple/compound
 - Representation of a diversity of styles
 - Representation of dynamic indications
 - Independent and complimentary use of right and left arms-hand complex
 - Entrances on beats other than one and incomplete beats
 - o Diversity of gestural vocabulary in the service of cues and more
 - Representation of a diversity of tempos and transitions
 - Tempo alterations
- Evaluate conducting techniques by:
 - Observing and evaluating conducting experiences
 - Observing and evaluating class members
 - o Reflection on different conductors of various ensembles in concert and rehearsal
- Demonstrate visual/aural discrimination skills through rehearsal situations
- Describe the role of the conductor in historical and philosophical perspectives
- Refine the essential skills of musicianship in a conducting context
- Internalize transpositions and their use in score reading through independent exercises and assignments

REQUIRED MATERIALS

Each student must have the following materials:

- Baton (subject to instructor approval; there will be an opportunity to purchase a custom baton within the first week of class)
- Course Handouts/Packet (provided by the instructor)
- Three-Ring binder, folder or tablet to organize your scores, handouts, articles and reflections
- Your major or secondary instrument as determined by the instructor.
- Electronic device with video recording capabilities (cell phone, video camera)
- Manuscript paper or composition software for transposition assignments
- Metronome, separate from the device using to record/video call

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Attendance/Participation: Attendance is expected for all scheduled classes. The nature of the course requires active participation and interaction among all class members at all times. Conducting Assignments: First and foremost, this is a participatory class. Each week involves practice and preparation. While it absolutely ok to make mistakes during the learning process, you must also be prepared to be engaged and willing to learn new concepts daily. Weekly conducting assignments will be given and graded. Each student will be expected to conduct the assigned musical excerpts in class with the class members as the ensemble (if in a live setting). Feedback will occur from the instructor and peers. The student must provide an electronic device with video recording capabilities to record their conducting experience. The opportunity to make up a missed conducting assignment will be at the discretion of the instructor.

Written Assignments and Tests: Individual written work pertinent to the course material will be assigned as needed. Examples include transposition assignments and quizzes, vocabulary/term assignments and quizzes, concert observations, rehearsal observations, article reviews, vocabulary quizzes, and conducting self-evaluations.

Discussion topics will be posted throughout the course. The purpose of the discussions is to provide awareness of the many viewpoints about the fundamentals of conducting and the role of the conductor/educator on the podium. Rather than restating or summarizing the author's ideas, the student is encouraged to synthesize the material and viewpoints represented and to critically reflect and relate the concepts expressed in the article to what you have learned in the class. The discussions are meant to spark positive dialogue with your personal background as the launching pad of learning.

Concert/Rehearsal Reflections: Each student must complete two (2) 45-minute rehearsal/concert observations (1 must be a rehearsal) with each reflecting attendance at a major university or professional (conducted) ensemble concert rehearsal. At UNT, these ensembles might include the A Cappella Choir, Concert Choir, Chamber Choir, Wind Symphony, Wind Orchestra, Opera, Symphony Orchestra, Chamber Orchestra, One O'Clock and Two O'Clock Lab Band. Professional ensembles include, but are not limited to the Dallas Symphony Orchestra, Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra, the Dallas Wind Symphony, Lonestar Wind Orchestra, etc. The student must be an observer and not a member of the ensemble. The observations should be drawn from two different ensembles and should represent different conductors. The reports must represent two different performing mediums (winds, orchestral, choral, or major jazz ensemble).

Transposition Project: Student will select an excerpt of a piece to transcribe into a flexible ensemble setting, pending approval by the instructor. All harmonies of the excerpt must be represented in the students' final projects. Students must provide at least four parts (representing soprano, alto, tenor and bass) utilizing all pitched instruments (C, Bb, Eb and F). Students may use Finale/Sibelius on the UNT lab computers (preferred) or free software online such as MuseScore or Noteflight.
