Course Description and Purpose

To continue to develop the knowledge and skills appropriate to professional conducting. The course will include instruction in intermediate conducting techniques, score study, rehearsal preparation and delivery, visual/aural discrimination skills, alternative movement approaches, and a reinforcement of essential musicianship. To summarize: students will study expressive gestures, critical listening, and effective rehearsal techniques.

Course Objectives

At the conclusion of this course, the student will be able to:

- Demonstrate efficient and expressive body carriage
- Demonstrate effective baton technique
- Demonstrate the following techniques:
 - Preparatory gestures, downbeats, and releases.
 - Patterns for various meters, including duple/triple, simple/compound.
 - Representation of a diversity of styles.
 - Representation of dynamic indications.
 - Independent and complimentary use of right and left arms-hand complex.
 - Entrances on beats other than one and incomplete beats.
 - Diversity of gestural vocabulary in the service of cues and more.
 - Representation of a diversity of tempos and transitions.
- Evaluate conducting techniques by:
 - Observing and evaluating videotaped conducting experiences.
 - Observing and evaluating class members.
 - Evaluating two different conductors of various ensembles in rehearsal.
 - Evaluating two different conductors of various ensembles in concert.
- Demonstrate visual/aural discrimination skills through rehearsal situations
- Describe the role of the conductor in historical and philosophical perspectives
- Refine the essential skills of musicianship in a conducting context.
- Internalize transpositions and their use in score reading through independent exercises and assignments.
- Demonstrate the ability to analyze a score with a focus on interpretation and rehearsal techniques.

- Smartphone or Personal Video Recording Device
- Your major or secondary instrument as determined by the instructor

Successful completion of the qualifying entrance examination for MUAG 3870.

Course Requirements

Attendance/Participation: Attendance is expected for all scheduled classes. The nature of a conducting course requires active participation and interaction among all class members at all times. Absence from class on a pre- assigned conducting day will result in the student being passed over for that conducting sequence, with a grade of 0 or no credit. Excused absences will be handled on a case-by-case basis and are best communicated in advance.

Absences will result in a lowering of the final grade as follows:

- 1-2 No effect
- 3-4 reduction of 1 letter grade
- 5-6 reduction of 2 letter grades
- 6+ grade of WF if withdrawal requested or final grade of F

Written Assignments and Tests: Individual written work pertinent to the lecture material will be assigned as needed. Examples include self-evaluation of conducting experiences, as well as rehearsal observations of professional conductors, as outlined below:

Rehearsal Observations: Each student is required to submit two completed rehearsal observations, each reflecting thirty minutes spent in a MAJOR university or professional (conducted) ensemble rehearsal. All reports must be typed: double-spaced, 12-point Times New Roman font, and all margins 1 inch. The length of the typed assignments must be a minimum of one page, and a maximum of two pages with the above guidelines followed. For full credit, this assignment must be turned in at the beginning of class on the given due date. Please see the section on Rehearsal Observations for more details of content and due dates.

Score Study and Analysis Projects: Students will be introduced to the score study and analysis process, with a culminating project that demonstrates comprehensions and application. More details to follow.

Weekly Conducting Assignments: Weekly conducting exercises and excerpts will be assigned and evaluated. Each student will be expected to conduct the assigned musical excerpts in class with the class members as the ensemble. The student must provide a method to record their conducting turn.

The following projects will serve as the core curriculum of the course; for each conducting round, students will be assigned a particular piece or movement or excerpt as appropriate, and then assignments will rotate each round. Special care will be made to focus on particular areas of growth as well as diversity of repertoire for each conductor.

- 1. Conductors Collegium Exercise Book
- 2. Transposition Project
- 3. Gustav Holst, First Suite in Eb
- 4. Wolfgang Mozart, Serenade in Eb Major, K.375
- 5. Project TBD.

Final Conducting Examination: The final week of class (Dec 2, Dec 4 2024) will be used for the final conducting projects.

Grading Procedures

The final grade is based on the following criteria.
