Course Content and Purpose:

The Fundamentals of Conducting course is designed for the development of a professional conducting approach. The course will cover beginning and intermediate conducting techniques, score analysis and preparation, development of visual and aural skills, and transposition skills.

Expected Outcomes:

Students will have made significant improvements in knowledge and ability in the following areas:

- 1. Physical technique of conducting
- 2. Score study and analysis
- 3. Aural skills
- 4. Transpositions

Course Requirements and Expectations:

This is a *skills-based course*, so regular attendance is essential (See specifics regarding class attendance below). Regular and thorough preparation for class is also required; this means *thorough* preparation of class conducting materials *before* each class session as well as practice of individual parts *before* each class session.

Attendance:

Attendance is expected for all scheduled classes. The nature of the course requires active participation and interaction among all class members at all times. Absences will result in a lowering of the final grade as follows:

Participation:

Participation will be graded, which includes but is not limited to class discussion, performance (singing/playing) for colleagues as the class ensemble, and reviewing/answering questions on important concepts discussed in the course.

Assignments:

Conducting Assignments:

Conducting assignments will be given and graded. Each student will be expected to conduct the assigned musical pieces/excerpts in class with the class members as the ensemble. Absence from class on a preassigned conducting assignment will result in the student being passed over for that conducting sequence, with a grade of zero or no credit. The instructor, in advance of the absence, may approve exceptions. The opportunity to make up a missed conducting assignment will be at the discretion of the instructor and will be rare. **Written self-evaluations of conducting videos** will be due after each conducting assignment.

Score Study Assignments:

Thorough score study is required for conducting assignments, and each of the marked scores will be graded on the same day scheduled for conducting.

Rehearsal Observations:

Each student is required to submit two rehearsal observations (choral and orchestral), each reflecting one hour spent in a university or professional ensemble rehearsal. The student must be an observer and not a member of the ensemble.

The provided Rehearsal Observation Guide lists the requisite areas for you to address during your observation. After your observation, transform your notes into complete sentences of scholarly writing (correct spelling and appropriate use of the English language is required). All reports must be typed: double spaced, 12-point Times New Roman font, 1-inch margins. The length must be a minimum of two pages. Failure to complete these requirements will result in the reduction of the final grade by one letter grade. For full credit, the assignments must be submitted by the dates and times listed in the course calendar.

Financial Aid and Satisfactory Academic Progress

Undergraduates

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid. Students must maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total hours registered. Students cannot exceed attempted credit hours above 150% of their required degree plan. If a student does not maintain the required standards, the student may lose their financial aid eligibility.

Students holding music scholarships must maintain a minimum 2.5 overall cumulative GPA and 3.0 cumulative GPA in music courses.
