Philosophy 4375 is a university core curriculum course.

Course Description

Feminism is an area of study in philosophy in which gender and gender oppressions are questioned, challenged, and theorized. This course will examine American and international feminisms with special attention to central and contemporary debates of gender, race, and class. Through close readings and engaging discussions, students will draw out connections between current social issues and their own personal and social responsibilities, particularly their impact on local and global communities.

Course Objectives

- Students are expected to identify the arguments in the readings, evaluate the strengths and weaknesses of each argument, and synthesize positions on debates.
- Students will become familiar with various approaches to feminism and social oppressions.
- Students will be able to analyze gender, gender oppression, and resistance to

gender hierarchies, especially through intersectional, decolonial, and transnational discourses.

- Students will be able to discuss feminist issues, focusing on historical, social and political realities, related to the intersections of gender, race, and class.
- Students will engage in cross-cultural discourses and connect their understandings of feminism with social and ethical responsibilities.

Course Schedule and Required Readings

To fully participate in the class, students will need internet access to reference Canvas and course materials. The course schedule lists the readings and assignment deadlines, it is available on Canvas. Readings are accessible digitally either through the UNT Library course guide* or through Canvas. The assigned readings should be read *prior* to the scheduled class discussions in order for each student to contribute to class discussions.

Discussion Boards

Students will complete three discussion boards. They will respond to a discussion prompt and to peers who post on the topic. Discussion boards will be completed on *Canvas*.

Exams

Exams consist of multiple choice, multiple responses, true/false, and short essay questions. The second exam is during the final exam period: December 11th 10:30am-12:30pm.

Group Presentations

In groups, students will deconstruct the argumentative structure of an assigned article. The group will examine the author's use of claims, evidence, reasoning, and counterarguments and present their analysis. They should also connect the analysis to key concepts and debates discussed in class.

Attendance

The course is scheduled to meet in person twice a week. Students are expected to attend every class on time. However, students are allowed three unexcused absences, without any penalty. After three unexcused absences, a 1% deduction will be applied to the attendance category for *each* missed class. Please note that attending less than 75% of a single class is considered an absence. If you miss a class, contact me immediately to discuss the class material and assignments.

Illness Related Measures

Students who have symptoms of illness should prioritize their health and that of their peers. This

may include that one refrain from participating in face-to-face instruction or other measures to minimize exposure. Contact the professor if this is the case to discuss course materials and assignments.

Participation

Student participation includes discussing the course materials, especially with an understanding of the argument and main claims, critiques, questions, and connections with other course materials. Participation will be evaluated through a variety of opportunities such as in-class quizzes, and class discussion, i.e., asking questions, offering analysis and/or commentary, engagement during small group discussions.

Given that technology is essential for this course, it is important you utilize it as an advantage and not as a distraction. As such, cell phones and headphones or earbuds are not permitted for use during class, unless stated by the professor. Continuous disruptions will impact the learning environment and may result in penalties from the student's overall participation score.

A Note on Late Assignments

Late assignments are not generally accepted. However, I understand life happens, so I do make exceptions for excusable reasons that include health and a family member's health. Exceptions do not include computer errors, work schedules, or simply forgetting an assignment. After an absence, students should contact me within 48 hours. Students are required to speak with me prior to submitting the assignment, so I can determine an alternative submission date with penalty.
