#### WHAT WE ARE DOING

This is a non-traditional class. We will be using our class time to work and discuss and you will be watching the lectures in the various modules via Canvas in a "flipped classroom" approach.

The class will be made of the following components:

- 25 video lectures giving an overview of the era and location we are covering that week. (2 lectures a week- released on Monday am.)
- 25 VERY brief quizzes to ensure you have watched each of the videos. (Released with the videos)
- 11 "Weekly Projects" Based on an era and area we are studying. (Released with the weekly videos on Monday and they will be due Sunday).
- 4 Research Projects.
- After the first two weeks each class will be a work session where you will work on your weekly projects.

The essence of this class boils down to- **Objects tell stories.** As they say "That's it. That's the tweet." As designers it is our job to use objects to tell stories.

(Please note when I use the word "Object" I mean-clothing, shoes, earrings, chairs, cookware--- all of it. All things that have been human made for use. This is different than a painting or sculpture that is made as to only be what it is- as opposed to be used or worn.)

So, Objects tell stories. As Theatre Artist we are story tellers. Shouldn't we use everything in our arsenal to tell that story? Yes.

SO this class for these 15 weeks will be about how to find the story in objects as well as expanding your visual dictionary so you have the ability to recognize trends and periods. It will also be about learning new places to look for information and inspiration. In no way can we cover anything but a surface glance at the different eras and areas but I hope that you will be able to take away from this class a good foundation for how to "read" objects and become familiar with their lines, materials etc so you can make an educated guess as to where it came from and a little about the culture that made it so that you can use it effectively on stage.
