Course Objectives

Students will obtain a broad understanding of the various disciplines within theatrical design deepening their appreciation and understanding of theatre.

Students will have a greater understanding of the collaboration between the disciplines and how best to navigate the design process.

Students will be able to understand and identify various elements of composition, color, form etc. intrinsic to all areas of design.

With the use of hands-on projects, group and individual work as well as research, students will develop a base level portfolio on which to build in subsequent classes.

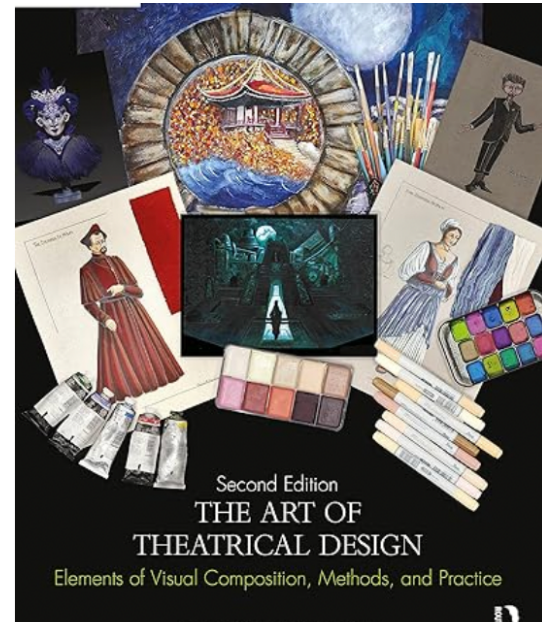

We will also be constructing a 3-D collage box with found objects so keep a box from your move in- no bigger than 2'x3'- shoe box size is usually best... and get ready to hunt for interesting objects.

All projects may require you to purchase more paint, paper, random supply but will be up to the individual design.

Any supply in the classroom not labeled is fair game for your use. Please be respectful of other's things.

*also a good idea not to let anyone throw away any magazines with images you can pull from- feel free to bring them to the studio for all to cut up and use.

You WILL be drawing/ painting/ cutting/ pasting and working with your hands to bring to life the images in your mind. You will be graded solely on your effort/ improvement and not on your ability to draw/ paint etc. I AM LOOKING FOR RISK AND GROWTH. I am fully aware that many of you do not have prior art class experience and imagination and creativity have been tested and drained out of you in your primary education. We are going to work to get you back to the freedom you had as a kindergartener... before you cared if each piece was a masterpiece, before there were absolute right or wrong answers, before exploring wasn't as important as the destination.

Quiz/ Test Policy- If it is clear that the reading assignments are not being done there will be pop quizzes instituted. I will judge this based on your sketchbook and class participation.

Late Work Policy- Since we will be critiquing the majority of work in class your assignments must be on time. If you are unable to have your work at the start of class it is due, the grade will drop 50% if turned in within 24 hours. After 24 hours it will not be accepted. This will be amended for excused absences. Please understand that this policy allows me to continue to work at a high level outside of class to continue to improve the department. AND Deadlines in theatre are real.

You Are Entering a Safe and Affirming Environment

We in the Department of Dance and Theatre strive to maintain a safe and affirming environment at all times.

A safe and affirming environment is a place for you to learn, visualize, contemplate, affirm, solve problems, get advice, express yourself, relax, have fun, hang out, and communicate with others. We use the phrase “safe and affirming” because it seems to incorporate the qualities of preciousness, sanctity, retreat, safety and refuge.

In the Department of Dance & Theatre, absolutely no one —whether they are a peer, faculty member, or administrative staff—is allowed to threaten, scare or harm another. We have “zero tolerance” for behavior that diminishes and alienates.

If anyone does threaten, scare or harm you, then report the incident immediately. The reporting can occur through face-to-face disclosure to faculty members or administrative staff you trust. You can also report the incident in writing as in an email, or in an anonymous note. Each report will be handled and investigated with utmost care and confidentiality.

Your feelings and concerns do matter and deserve full attention.

Keep in mind that you are not accusing anyone by reporting. You are simply reporting concerns about someone’s conduct. In actuality, you are fulfilling your responsibility of keeping everyone safe.

Also, keep in mind that no form of retaliation will be tolerated.

A safe and affirming environment is possible. It starts with respect and support, requires that we address the hurt and pain inflicted, and continues with efforts to remedy our mistakes going forward.

Department Policies

Instructors can drop students on the first day of class for being absent without prior arrangement. Dance/ Theatre students are expected to budget and organize their time and efforts in order to meet both their academic and production commitments satisfactorily and on time. The faculty and staff recognize that the academic and production assignment within the Department as well as outside employment and other obligations sometimes impose conflicting pressures on Dance/ Theatre students. One of the principal responsibilities of each student is to carefully identify and monitor the commitments that compromise of their departmental assignments and outside obligations. It is also important to keep in mind that production work and outside obligations do not constitute an excused absence from any class or from the completion of any required class assignment.

To remain a theatre major and to graduate, students majoring in theatre must maintain a cumulative grade point average of 2.5 for all theatre courses.

The department does not allow students to obtain a D or below more than twice in a theatre course comprising the major. Once the student receives the second D or below in the same course, the student will be dismissed from the department.

ODA
