COURSE Prerequisite

The prerequisite for this course is the successful completion of German 2050 or the equivalent.

COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

This course is designed to expand and reinforce the basic and intermediate vocabulary, to further enhance communicative skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing, within a topically-organized curriculum. The topics expand on those covered in the previous semesters of German and complete the groundwork for upper level German classes. The main emphasis will be on classroom interaction, so students are urged to attend class

regularly, to be on time, and to be prepared.

WHAT CAN YOU EXPECT FROM THIS COURSE?

You can expect to encounter and to work on mastering intermediate communication skills in German and to acquire a deeper understanding of the German culture. This is a communicative, student-centered course, which means that you will interact a great deal with your classmates. Acquiring a foreign language requires much practice and repetition.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THIS COURSE:

- 1 <u>HOMEWORK/WORKBOOK ASSIGNMENTS</u> will be given regularly. The homework may be a written and/or an oral preparation. Written assignments will be due at the beginning of class on the assigned due day. On some occasions, written assignments will be collected and checked by your instructor; on other occasions the material assigned will be discussed and corrected in class. Your written homework must be neat and legible. <u>Your answers should be written in complete sentences, unless the instructor specifies otherwise</u>. Please use <u>double space</u> so that comments or corrections can be more easily inserted. Underline or highlight any key or featured words. Please do not use red pen or pencil. Furthermore, by the end of each chapter, all relevant exercises in the Workbook need to be completed. <u>Homework will not be accepted after the beginning of the class for which it has been assigned and must be submitted in person by the student.</u>
- 2 <u>QUIZZES</u> will be given on vocabulary and/or grammar. It is therefore imperative that you keep up with your studies on a daily basis. The quizzes will cover the material currently being studied and will be announced. <u>Note:</u> There will be NO make-up quizzes.
- 3 <u>Presentation</u> will be given once during the semester. Your instructor will give you information about the topic (*Städte- oder Personenporträt*) and format (group of max. 3 students, 10 minutes, in German) a week before it is due.
- 4 <u>Oral Exams</u> will be administered three times during the semester. Your instructor will give you information about the topic and format one week before. <u>There will be NO makeup exams unless cleared with the instructor with written medical documentation</u>.
- 5 <u>Conversation Slips (Gesprächszettel)</u> will be completed by each student; that is, each student will have four out-of-class conversations in German during the semester, either at the *Kaffeeklatsch* (max. 2) or with one of the other instructors during their office hours. (At least) two of these conversations need to be done by October 20 and the remainder by December 1.

- 6 <u>Essays</u> will be composed in class twice during the semester. Your instructor will give you information about the topic and format (about 200-250 words) a week before the essay is due.
- 7 THE <u>FINAL EXAM</u> will be comprehensive. Taking the Final Exam is mandatory to receive a passing grade in this course.
- 8 REGULAR ATTENDANCE is required. Repeated unexcused absences and tardiness will affect your grade significantly. Three tardies is the equivalent of one absence. Leaving class before the end of the period will be considered an absence. You are allowed a maximum of two (2) absences, whether excused or unexcused, without penalty. After two absences, your attendance grade will suffer in percent. After the eighth absence, you will receive a failing grade for the entire class. Excused absences are only: A.) illness with doctor's documentation, B.) official university sponsored activities, and C.) the observance of certain religious holidays, provided the student has notified the instructor in writing within the first fifteen days of the semester and/or deadline as specified in the Academic Calendar. (See "Class Attendance" in the University Catalog for details.) If your absence is not excused, you will receive a grade of zero (0) for any homework assignment due that day and/or quiz grade will count double.
- 9 <u>CLASS PARTICIPATION</u> is an essential foundation for learning a language. Consistent and constructive participation is expected from all students. Attendance is critical in such a course, as progress suffers when assignments and daily contributions to class work falter. Repetition and especially creativity are essential in language study, and this course is planned and organized to supply both. Worksheets reflecting the material currently taught will be used to enlarge your vocabulary and to help you to better master the language. Material covered on the worksheets may be included on quizzes and tests. Cellular phones must be switched off and kept out of sight. If it is visible to the instructor, you will receive a zero grade for participation on that day. The use of laptop computers in class is not allowed.
- 10 <u>Grading Policy</u>: Your grade in this course is based on your scores earned throughout the semester. Regular attendance and active participation during the class period are reflected positively in your final grade. Your final grade will be determined as followed:
