Course Prerequisite:

The prerequisite for this course is the successful completion of German 2050 or the equivalent.

Course Description and Objectives:

This course is designed to reinforce and expand basic and intermediate grammar competence and to acquire a deeper understanding of German sentence and phrase structures. The topics expand on those covered in the previous semesters of German and complete the groundwork for upper level German classes. Although the main emphasis will be on grammatical structures, the discussions will be in German. Besides speaking, we will also integrate some other linguistic skills. Acquiring a foreign language requires much practice and repetition. Students are urged to attend class regularly, to be on time, and to be prepared.

CLASS requirement for Communication and Digital Skills:

This course fulfills the CLASS requirement for Communication and Digital Skills. At the end of this course, students should be able to demonstrate effective communication using a digital technological platform and do at least two of the following: 1. Demonstrate the ability to communicate a central idea effectively using appropriate organization/structure. 2. Demonstrate the ability to develop content at an advanced level using a combination of effective supporting materials. 3. Demonstrate the ability to engage in verbal and nonverbal communication behaviors that are appropriate for the audience and adhere to the conventions of the medium selected (written, oral, or visual).

General Course Policies:

- Attendance will be taken
- REGULAR ATTENDANCE is required. Repeated unexcused absences and tardiness will affect your grade significantly. Three tardies is the equivalent of one absence. You are allowed a maximum of two (2) absences, whether excused or unexcused, without penalty. After two absences, your attendance grade will suffer in percent. After the eighth absence, you will receive a failing grade for the entire class. If your absence is excused, you may submit the homework next time and take an exam at a later time agreed to by the instructor. If your absence is not excused, you will receive a grade of zero (0) for any homework assignment due that day and/or for any quiz/exam given that day.
- 2 <u>CLASS PARTICIPATION</u> is an essential foundation for learning a language. Consistent and constructive participation is expected from all students. Attendance is critical in such a course, as progress suffers when assignments and daily contributions to class work falter.
- 3 <u>HOMEWORK ASSIGNMENTS</u> will be given regularly. The homework may be a written and/or an oral preparation. **Your written homework must be typed**. <u>Your answers should be written in complete sentences unless the instructor specifies otherwise</u>. Please use <u>double space</u> so that comments or corrections can be more easily inserted. Underline or highlight any key or featured words. The material assigned will be discussed and corrected in class. Please have a copy in front of you when we go over the assignment.
- 4 <u>QUIZZES</u> will be given as needed. It is therefore imperative that you keep up with your studies on a daily basis. The quizzes will cover the material currently being studied and will be announced. <u>Note: There will be NO make-up quizzes</u>.
- Three TESTS will cover the material studied through the last class before test day. Tests will reflect everything covered in class or assigned as homework. Any additional material which your instructor may supply from sources outside your textbook, may be tested on quizzes or exams. All tests will be announced. Note that you may not leave the Zoom session during the test. There will be NO make-up tests unless cleared with the instructor with written medical documentation (for other reasons, you MUST inform your instructor within the first two weeks of the semester).
- The <u>FINAL PROJECT</u> will be on linguistic variation in German comparing Standard German to the dialectal/colloquial language. This will include a PowerPoint presentation and a written summary. More details will be provided in class.
- 7 <u>GRADING POLICY</u>: Your grade in this course is based on your scores earned throughout the semester. Regular attendance and active participation during the class period are reflected positively in your final grade. Your final grade will be determined as followed:
