Course Description and Objectives:

The purpose of this course is to help students acquire formal tools for linguistic theory, and to help them make their first steps toward applying those tools to natural language syntax, the study of linguistic structure. The focus will be on modelling syntactic intuitions of human beings about possible sentences and other structures.

The goals of this course are twofold:

- 1) to develop the conceptual tools needed for the analysis of structure
- 2) to get acquainted with a number of issues in syntax

The main language of investigation will be English, but we will also discuss examples from other languages as presented in the textbook and other materials. More generally, the course aims at further developing analytical linguistic skills and a deeper understanding of language. The class is participatory (this is not a lecture course): that means, students should take notes on their readings at home.

General Course Policies:

It is recommended to do the assignments in the following sequence: chapter video clips, textbook chapter, chapter exercises. In addition, students will write three chapter papers.
- <u>4. Discussion of Survey/Research Paper</u>: In teams, students will present the main findings of a survey or research paper during the final part of the class.
- <u>5. Optional Quizzes</u>: Students are invited to take optional quizzes. They will count as extra credit.
- <u>6. Final Project</u>: The Final Project will consist of a longer paper. It will be based on the material studied in class but applied to a different language. It will be due on May 10.

7. Length and Formatting of Write-ups:
