Course Prerequisite:

The prerequisite for this course is the successful completion of German 2050 or its equivalent.

Course Description and Objectives:

This course is designed to improve basic and intermediate pronunciation skills and to acquire a deeper understanding of German phonetics including the International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA). The topics expand on those covered in the previous semesters of German and complete the groundwork for upper level German classes. The discussions will be in German. Besides speaking and listening, we will also integrate some other linguistic skills. Acquiring a foreign language requires much practice and repetition. Students are urged to attend class regularly, to be on time, and to be prepared.

1 <u>REGULAR ATTENDANCE</u> is required. Repeated unexcused absences and tardiness will affect your grade significantly. Three tardies is the equivalent of one absence. <u>Leaving class before the end of the period will be considered an absence</u>. You are allowed a maximum of three (3) absences, whether excused or unexcused, without penalty. After three absences, your attendance grade will suffer in percent. <u>After the twelfth</u>

- (12th) absence, you will receive a failing grade for the entire class. Excused absences are only: A.) illness with doctor's documentation, B.) official university sponsored activities, and C.) the observance of certain religious holidays (see University Class Attendance Regulations in the UNT Policy Manual for details). If your absence is excused, you may turn in homework or take a quiz/exam at a later time agreed to by the instructor. If your absence is not excused, you will receive a grade of zero (0) for any homework assignment due that day and/or for any quiz/exam given that day.
- 2 <u>CLASS PARTICIPATION</u> is an essential foundation for learning a language. Consistent and constructive participation is expected from all students. Attendance is critical in such a course, as progress suffers when assignments and daily contributions to class work falter. Cellular phones must be switched off and kept out of sight. If it is visible to the instructor, you will receive a grade of zero for participation on that day. The use of laptop computers in class is not allowed.
- HOMEWORK ASSIGNMENTS will be assigned regularly. The homework may be a written and/or an oral preparation. Written assignments will be due at the beginning of class on the assigned due day. Your written homework must be neat and legible. Your answers should be written in complete sentences, unless the instructor specifies otherwise. Please use double space so that comments or corrections can be more easily inserted. Underline or highlight any key or featured words. Please do not use red pen or pencil. Homework will not be accepted after the beginning of the class for which it has been assigned and must be submitted in person by the student. If it is specified by the instructor that the homework is to be turned in after class, take notes during class in a different color.
- Written <u>QUIZZES</u> will be given on a regular basis. It is therefore imperative that you keep up with your studies on a daily basis. The quizzes will cover the material currently being studied and will be announced. <u>Note: There will be NO make-up quizzes</u>.
- Three oral <u>TESTS</u> will be given, the last one being a longer test. They consist of oral group assignments. <u>There will be NO make-up tests unless cleared with the instructor with written medical</u> documentation (for other reasons, you MUST inform your instructor within the first two weeks of the semester).
- Two written <u>EXAMS</u> will cover the material studied through the last class before test day. Tests will reflect everything covered in class or assigned as homework. Any additional material which your instructor may supply from sources outside your textbook, may be tested on quizzes or exams. All tests will be announced. Note that you may not leave the classroom during the test. <u>There will be NO make-up exams unless cleared with the instructor with written medical documentation (for other reasons, you MUST inform your instructor within the first two weeks of the semester).</u>
- 7 The <u>FINAL EXAM</u> will be comprehensive. Taking the Final Exam is mandatory to receive a passing grade in this course.
