Course Description

Theatre 1340 is a survey course that is designed to acquaint students with the theory and practice of theatre art throughout the world; appreciation of drama in both western and nonwestern cultures; principles of dramatic criticism; and cultural and social significance of the theatre and its drama. This interactive course promotes awareness of the scope and variety of works in the theatrical arts, critical analysis and formation of aesthetic judgments, and appreciation of the arts as fundamental to the health and survival of any society. An overview of the major aspects of theatre history, genres, play production, the audience and its relationship to theatre, and specific study of scripts and productions, including attendance and thoughtful analysis or criticism of the live works, will help develop a deeper understanding of theatre in its many forms.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course a student should be able to:

- 1. Identify several works by contemporary and classic playwrights, performers, directors, composers, nations, and movements.
- 2. Develop, improve, and apply critical analytical skills to live performances.
- 3. Discuss what genres or artists or works appeal to his/her personal sense of aesthetics, and convey respect to differing individuals.
- 4. Connect with, consider, and discuss the cultural allusions our society has taken from certain dramatic works such as *Lysistrata*, and *Twelfth Night*.
- 5. Speak and write in an educated manner on the appreciation of the arts.
- 6. Utilize skills, observed in theatre, in personal expression and communication.
- 7. Collaborate with classmates on the creation of a creative project in which theatre skills are utilized.

THEA 1340 Disclaimer:

This course incorporates global content and often addresses content with adult themes. Some of the plays are heavy in nature, containing adult language and addressing issues that are controversial in nature. Please be aware of this and plan accordingly. Look through the plays early on so as to determine if taking this course is right for you.

III. Written and Oral Responses to Events

- A. Discussion Board Assignments: For each play read (and chapters not discussed in class), you are required to complete a WRITTEN RESPONSE via a DISCUSSION BOARD ASSIGNMENT (DBA) analyzing various aspects of the content and relating it to personal experience and course topics. This should mirror a discussion that would take place in a face-to-face course.
- **B.** Essay Paper and Critique (DBA #4): For each performance you attend, you are required to write a short essay, connecting the performances to the plays read in class as well as the class content. This should be written in MLA or APA format.

Please note: Save your ticket AND program. This is proof of attendance, along with a sign in sheet at the end of each performance.

- IV. <u>Quizzes</u>: Assessments for this course include **3-4 Quizzes** on vocabulary and concepts covered in the course lectures, assigned readings, and performance events. To succeed, you must attend class regularly and take good notes. The quizzes will be objective (multiple choice/ true or false/short answer) in format. All quizzes are given through Blackboard. See schedule for dates. Pop quizzes may occur if it is evident that students aren't completing the readings required for each class. *There will be no make ups for quizzes*.
- V. <u>Group Project: The Theatre Experience:</u> Students are required to participate in a "hands on" group project. Working in teams, you will create a 3 to 5-minute play in response to one of our core themes. This project involves close collaboration with fellow students; each team member must make significant, documented contributions to the group effort. I have allotted considerable class time for group work on this project. On any "Group Project Day" (labeled on the course schedule), your attendance and participation is *essential and mandatory*, not

only to your success, but also to that of your group as a whole. Chronic absences, tardiness, and lack of preparation and involvement in the group project are grounds for dismissal from your group and forfeiture of 150 points. Your group will also have the ability and authority to assign you a failing grade for this assignment should you not fulfill your obligations in their eyes, so be certain to put your best foot forward at all times. In groups, you will present your short plays and related research during our final examination period for the class.

VII. Course Policies:

A. Attendance Policy:

- This class demands your active, engaged *presence*. You must attend regularly and pay close attention to succeed. If you are absent, you are responsible for getting lecture notes, material handouts, and class announcements from another student. Any Group Project Day is mandatory and attendance points will be given on these days.
- **TARDINESS:** Class will begin promptly. Please respect your classmates, your instructor, guests, and your investment in your education and show up on time. Three (3) tardies will be counted as one absence.
- **ATTENDANCE ON GROUP PROJECT DAYS**: We have several Group Project Days (asterisked on the schedule). These add up quickly, particularly in the second half of the semester.

Each day will have a related group assignment with points allotted toward your project grade. Students who are absent or tardy will not be eligible on for group points related to that day's assignment. Groups will be empowered to dismiss a member for chronic absence or lack of participation and contribution. Students dismissed from their group have little chance of passing the course. Each group member will be allotted ONE excused absence in the group project portion of the class. **25 pts will be subtracted from individual students' final project grade for any absences above the one excused absence. **

- Because there are grading points allotted for attendance and in-class assignments, signing-in for someone else who is not present, or leaving class after signing-in, is an infringement of the UNT Academic Integrity policy.
- On **non-group project days**, you are allowed THREE (3) absences (unexcused or excused). On the 5th unexcused absence, your grade will drop a full letter grade.
- Excused absences need official documentation and are related to religious observance, UNT sanctioned events, and illness when seen by a medical professional. Students who do not attend the final exam period (or who leave early) will receive a zero ("0") as their grade for the Group Project (a 150-point deduction from their final grade). All students will stay for the duration of all performances. Travel/holiday plans do not constitute a valid excuse for missing the final.

- **E. Grading:** I make every effort to evaluate and return your work in a timely manner. Generally, you may expect me to return graded assignments within two weeks of submission. The size of our class limits my ability to provide detailed feedback to each of you on your assignments. If you are confused about my grading procedures or wish further feedback from me regarding your work a particular assignment, please email your questions or make an appointment to see me. Points are most often deducted due to the following reasons, so be certain to avoid these errors to receive full credit for an assignment:
 - Vague, thin discussion, lacking in detail and depth.
 - Poor structure/lack of thesis.
 - Typographical errors. (Proofread your assignments prior to turning them in.)
