Attendance:

Attendance in this class is mandatory. In case of illness or emergencies, contact the instructor by phone (214-395-4008) or e-mail in advance, if at all possible. Cancellations by the instructor shall given with 48 hours notice whenever possible.

Course Objectives:

To learn the standard orchestral and band excerpts individually and in a clarinet section in preparation to be successfully prepared for an orchestral or band audition. Students will be required to know before each class the excerpts that will be studied in that class period. There will be a mock audition for the final exam.

Required Materials:

Students will be required to purchase and bring to class "The Working Clarinetist" Peter Hadcock and a recording device

E-Mail:

All students are expected to have e-mail ability and should check messages for communications.

Grading:

It is essential that you know the aspects of your performance and preparation that comprise this evaluation process. Your grade for the semester will be based on the following criteria:

The final semester grade will be lowered by one letter grade for every two unexcused absences. Excused absences such as personal or family illness, class conflict, etc. must be approved in advance.
