Textbook

Course Contents

Hands-on introduction to deep learning emphasizing application using GPU-accelerated hardware to train multilayer machine learning models directly on raw input signals. Discusses the foundations of feedforward networks, convolutional neural networks, and recurrent networks. Using real datasets and popular deep learning tools (e.g., Tensorflow, Keras), students create systems to make inferences from rich and varied raw data including speech, video, and other signals. Topics include:

- Machine learning primer and introduction to deep learning
- The Perceptron
- Backpropagation, auto-differentiation, and tensors
- Convolutional Neural Networks (CNNs)
- Recurrent Neural Networks (RNNs)
- Building models: regularization, optimization and hyperparameter tuning
- Evaluation
- Transfer Learning
- Autoencoders and Generative Adversarial Networks
- Ethics: fairness, accountability, transparency, and biases
