Course Description: This course examines the U.S. Supreme Court from an institutional point of view. That is, we will explore varying aspects of the U.S. Supreme Court including its policymaking role, how Justices select and decide cases, how Justices are appointed, how the Supreme Court interacts with other branches of government, interest groups, the public, and how decisions are implemented and their impact.

Course Objectives: By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Explain the Court's place in the judicial system
- 2. Analyze the Court as an institution
- 3. Identify and explain justice's selection, backgrounds, careers, and circumstances for leaving the Court
- 4. Explain how cases reach the Court through the actions of parties to cases, the lawyers who represent them, interest groups, the federal government in its special role and finally, and how and why the Court selects the small number of cases that it will fully consider and decide.
- 5. Explain the factors that influence the Court's choices among alternative decisions and policies.
- Explain the kinds of issues on which the Court concentrates, the policies it supports, and the extent of its activism in the making of public policy.
- 7. Explain the ways in which other government policymakers respond to the Court's decisions, as well as the Court's impact on American society as a whole.

<u>Written Assignment</u>: Choose a landmark Supreme Court decision (list to be provided later) and provide me with a written autopsy of it. In other words, I would strongly suggest that your paper succinctly address the following:

- a.) Facts & historical context of the case.
- b.) Legal issues involved.
- c.) Attorneys & groups involved.
- d.) Reason for the case to be before the Court.
- e.) Was there opposition to the granting of certiorari (if applicable)?
- f.) Outcome of the case (reverse, affirm).
- g.) Policy established by the majority opinion.
- h.) Author of the majority and/or concurring/dissenting opinion along with his/her basic ideological beliefs, objections to, or reasons for voting with the majority.
 - Why was this Justice placed on the Court?
 - Why was this Justice selected to write this opinion?
- i.) Policy concerns of concurring and dissenting opinions (if applicable).
- j.) Was the ruling liberal or conservative in your opinion? If so, why?
- k.) What was the societal impact of the case?

Ideas on how to address each of the topics in your paper will be evident as we work through the various chapters of the textbook. I'll add some helpful links from the UNT library in Canvas.

Write all this up in a **TYPED** paper not less than ten (10), and no more than twelve (12) pages, double-spaced with a 12-point font (this syllabus is in a 12-point font) and standard margins. **THE PAPER IS DUE AT NOON ON NOVEMBER 25TH.** If it is late, you lose a letter grade! **FAILURE TO COMPLETE THIS ASSIGNMENT WILL RESULT IN A FAILING CLASS GRADE!**
