Course Description:

This course primarily explores the aesthetics of dance as an art form. It also examines many components that go into creating a dance, including investigating the dancer-artist, the dancer -body, the 'business' of dance, and the artistic practices and methods used to create art from moving bodies. There is emphasis placed on the development of an appreciation for dance as a form of communication, connection, and as a reflection of contemporary society through the lens of dance in the 20th and 21st centuries. It also explores dance's evolution throughout history in various contexts (societies/cultures). This course includes lectures, films, digital mediums, live performances, and group/partner discussions, as well as written and verbal critical analysis. Course content will cover a wide survey of dance genres from all over the world including social/cultural forms to more codified, traditional forms that are more generally known; everything from kathak to ballet to tango to butoh and beyond. The course is 3 credit hours.

Course Reading:

No required reading. Supplemental readings will be assigned and provided by the instructor as the course proceeds.

Required Materials:

-Anything to take notes during class lectures and discussions. (i.e., notepad & pen, tablet, etc.)

Recommended Materials:

-laptop/tablet for occasional use in class sessions (such as research)

Course Objectives:

Students will be able to develop an informed, critical understanding and appreciation of the art form of dance in its most current context. These critical skills will be cultivated through the study and observation of a wide sampling of its various forms such as ballet, contemporary, social & cultural dance ("global"), improvisation/freestyle, jazz, modern, and tap. With each dance form investigated, a brief study of its history will be conducted to provide context. Utilizing a wide range of sources to observe dance forms including digital, live performance, and literature, students will be able to identify unique characteristics and aesthetics of movement across different genres and mediums. Consideration will also be made to understand the art-making process in dance, looking at all the components (producer, choreographer, dancer/performer, etc.) in the development of a production. As a result, a student will be able to confidently articulate specific and informed language when observing, analyzing, and enjoying dance to reflect their growing knowledge and understanding.

In addition, an examination into dance's relationship to the greater society and culture will be conducted. This will include exploring dance's historical significance to society and cultures, its current role, and dance in the greater economy. Attention will also be given to the developing impact that is being actively shaped by current and emerging dance artists. A brief look into what constitutes a healthy, successful dance artist and the different career opportunities that exist will also be investigated.

Classroom Etiquette & Student Expectations:

- Practice respect. Students will participate in a lot of group and in class discussions regarding dance throughout the course. The subjectivity of art alongside varying levels of understanding can create potential friction. As such, it is important to maintain an open space to allow for productive and stimulating conversations that can inform all participants in their learning.
- Come to class prepared. Bring anything that is required for that day (completed assignments, readings, necessary materials, etc.). **TURN OFF your cell phones** or leave them on silent during class. If seen utilizing your cell phone for a reason other than class engagement, it may be confiscated. You are responsible for how you learn in this course so please make the most of this opportunity for yourself.
- Be ready to start class on time. If you are more than 10 minutes late, it will be recorded as a tardy arrival. Three tardies equal 1 absence (See Attendance policy below).

- No food/snacks consumed during active teaching times to minimize distraction. Water bottles and covered drinks are acceptable. A short break will be provided during class where some food/snacks can be consumed per instructor's discretion. **{DO NOT LEAVE TRASH IN THE ROOM}**.
- Remain open-minded, positive, and eager to learn. Reaching the course objectives successfully (and beyond) will rely on your own attitude and mindset each time you come to class. Be an active participant; take notes, ask questions, contribute to discussion, and allow space to support others in their learning.
- Check email or Canvas regularly to stay updated on any last minute updates, notices, or etc regarding the course.
- Uphold professionalism at all times. This is a university level learning environment and as such, you are expected to remain professional in all facets of the course. Show up in a way that exhibits the serious investment you have in yourself. Additionally, as dance is an art form based on the body, there will be moments when observing dance where performers may have less clothing than is typical. It is important to continue to approach any performance of a moving body with a lens of maturity, discretion, and appreciation. *Note: if a student is easily offended by nudity or other elements that could be potentially offensive (i.e.- uncensored song lyrics, highly political/divisive messaging, suggestive themes, sexuality, etc), it is highly recommended to drop the course.*
- Exhibit appropriate behavior in communication and correspondences (i.e, email or in class). Maintain clear, concise and appropriate language. No emojis or slang words in emails. Be sensitive of sharing private information.
- If any issues arise for any reason, please reach out to your instructor to remedy the situation as soon as possible.

Required Live Performances:

A significant learning component of this course is to observe live dance performances in the DFW metroplex. Accordingly, all students are required to attend a certain number of the mandatory live performances during the semester. This term, **it is required for the student to attend ALL 3 performances** (on rare occasions, an alternative performance may be observed if coordinated with the instructor beforehand). Students will be expected to coordinate their own travel to and from the events. Please be mindful of transit time & potential traffic, locating parking, additional parking fees (\$5-\$15), and appropriate dress codes. The performance ticketing fees are covered by student course fees; there is no need for additional payments.

It is expected that the students treat the live performances as an extension of classroom teaching. The same rules of etiquette and expectations will be upheld. It is encouraged that students bring note-taking materials/devices to assist in recording any thoughts/impressions of the performance between pieces. Typically, any recording of the actual performance is **not** allowed in most venues. Regular class sessions will **not** be held the week that a mandatory performance is occurring.

Students are required to show up and check in with their instructor at least 1 hour prior (unless designated otherwise) to the show. Tickets will be handed out by the instructor at check-in. If you miss check-in, tickets may be picked up from the box office under the name of the instructor. It is your responsibility to notify the instructor of your arrival at the earliest opportunity. Some shows may not allow you to be seated late. The general rule is: **it is better to show up early than on time.**

Live Performance Etiquette:

- Turn off cell phones or put on DO NOT DISTURB mode during the show.
- Do not use your cell phone flashlight to take notes during performance pieces.
- NO pictures or videos are permitted.
- NO talking during performances.
- Remain in your seat for the performance. If needed, wait until intermission to get up.

Course Evaluation Procedures:

Class Participation:

Daily class participation is mandatory and highly encouraged. Your willingness to fully engage, work hard consistently, and take responsibility will be a critical factor in your learning. In order to achieve the course objectives, the expectation is that you will consistently work to observe and uphold classroom etiquette, student expectations, and thoroughly complete assignments.

Class Participation includes:

- o Attending required performances as dictated by instructor (in syllabus)
- o Observing dance works (live or via class instruction) with respect, openness, and curiosity
- o Partaking in any practical application of taught topics, concepts, techniques, etc.
- o Actively listening to presentations by instructor or peers, taking notes if needed
- o Contributing to classroom discussions on topics (sharing insights, asking questions, etc.)
- o Participating actively in any required group work, each member of the group holding equal weight in contributions
- o Engaging in the weekly discussion boards via Packback. Every week there will be a requirement for students to create questions & responses to serve as additional engagement with the course content and to interact with fellow classmates. **These discussions are worth 15% of your total grade.** (See *Packback Discussions* section below for more details including setup, how to's, etc).

Assignments:

- o In & Out of Class assignments- These will be a mix of group and individual work as dictated by the instructor and the content to which it relates.
- o Quizzes will be given occasionally to ensure that assigned readings are being maintained and to test knowledge on recently taught topics.
- o Research/Reading will be required as assigned by the instructor throughout the course. These will help inform the students' understanding of a concept to be able to fully engage in class & Packback discussions, observe dance with a critical eye, and to increase general knowledge.
- o For assignments that are required via online submission, please note the time it is due by AND the method of submission (via email, Canvas, in person, etc.).

Post-Performance Reflection & Research Project (written OR video submission):

There is ONE research and reflective post-performance project assigned this term that will be based on a live performance that was previously attended. This is to supplement a student's learning experience through the analysis of observing live performance. The performance project can be done via a written submission OR a video submission. If written, it must be done within the Packback application. If submitting a video, an accompanying outline of talking points must be included. Content of the projects should emphasize prior taught concepts in class as it relates to the most recent performance attended. There will be a requirement of citing a minimum of three sources which are cited in the proper APA format (including a reference list). **These projects are weighted 20% of your total grade.**

Midterm Group Project:

There will be a 10 minute group presentation project required around the midpoint of the term. The topic will be about a specific dance form and will include a critical analysis of a performance in that dance form. Project topics and performances shall be proposed and approved prior to the starting work on the presentation. Each student will both be graded individually and as a group. It is expected that each group member upholds equal involvement in the presentation. A major portion of the grade will incorporate a peer-grading and self-grading system. There will be time allotted during class hours to support the development and practice of the presentation. **This assignment is worth 20% of your total grade. **NO grace period submission for ALL midterm project assignments***

Final Project: Reflection & Research Video Submission

In lieu of a final exam, students will complete a reflection & research video presentation (minimum 6-7 min long, maximum 10 min long). This final project will mostly serve as the students' informed reflection of one the final performances observed PLUS commentary on lessons learned throughout the course. By the end of the semester, it is assumed that the student will have developed a critical eye for dance and will thus be able to accurately communicate their thoughts, supported by credible external sources. This project should cover the concepts taught in class and utilized in a way to thoroughly analyze the observed final performance. It will also highlight valuable (and personally relevant) lessons learned by the student as they engaged with the course. It is required that the student cite 4 sources (minimum) in APA format to fortify their thoughts and submit alongside a robust outline of talking points. **This assignment is worth 30% of your total grade.**

****NO grace period submission for the Final Project***

Extra Credit:

Throughout the semester, there will be opportunities to receive extra credit via further engagement with dance outside of the formal coursework. Opportunities will be posted in Canvas. Some of these extra credit opportunities include attending a dance/movement class or an extra curricular performance (one that is **not** part of the mandatory course performances and must be approved by the instructor beforehand).

Packback Discussions:

As participation is a mandatory requirement for this course, the *Packback Questions* platform will be used for online discussion about class topics. *Packback Questions* is an online community where you can be fearlessly curious and ask open-ended questions to build on top of what is covered in class and relate topics to real-world applications. For a brief introduction to *Packback Questions* and why it is being utilized in class, watch this [video](#).

Packback Requirements:

Your participation on Packback will count toward 15% of your overall course grade.

In general, there will be a weekly deadline for submissions. In order to receive full credit, you should submit the following:

- 1 Question by MON evening (at 11:59PM) **minimum curiosity score 30 pts*
- 2 Responses by FRI evening (at 11:59PM) **minimum curiosity score 30 pts*

**It is recommended that you keep your graded work throughout the semester. This is in case there are discrepancies with any grade records. Students can track their grades and progress via Canvas.*

Late Work, Makeup Work, and Alternative Assignment Policy:

NO late work is accepted. A deadline for each assignment is posted in Canvas, *however*, there is a *24 hour grace period* that is offered for most submissions (***NOT the midterm OR final project**).

Once that 24 hour grace period has passed, any submitted work will NOT be graded. Technical issues are not a valid excuse for missing the *grace period* deadline. Even if an assignment is submitted one minute late, it will **not** be graded. If there is an issue submitting on Canvas, a student can email their submission/files directly to the instructor; this submission must also meet the *grace period* deadline and will **not** be graded if submitted late. In general, it is recommended to turn something in rather than nothing. Incomplete submissions will earn credit vs. a '0' for an assignment that lacked a submission.

In extenuating circumstances, an exception can be made to the late work policy. A student must communicate with the instructor within 1 week after the occurrence. The student is then required to submit substantiated documentation which will only be accepted if it is in alignment with UNT Policy 06.039 regarding excused absences. The required documentation to validate a late submission must be from valid sources such as doctor, school official, coach, family member, etc. Alternatively, the student can reach out to the Dean of Students to request assistance and advocacy in their coursework. The Dean of Students will then contact the instructor directly to validate the student's situation and needs.

Late Work, Makeup Work, and Alternative Assignment Policy (continued):

★ Typically, a student **can not** make up a missed assignment (especially an in-class assignment). A student should contact the instructor immediately so that a remedial plan can be created. In most cases, an **alternative assignment** can be submitted to make up for the points missed. This is usually done via the submission of a chosen extra credit assignment. That assignment must be **submitted via email/Canvas message** directly to the instructor. Students must make up missed assignments **within 1 week** of the original assignment's due date. Note: If completing an extra credit assignment, the student will not receive any **additional** 'EXTRA' credit points to their total grade.

Attendance Policy:

- Generally, the expectation is that students are fully responsible for their engagement with all mandatory in-person elements of this course (performances, class, etc). It is on the student to stay in line with the policies stated in the syllabus. As such, there is a “no questions asked” policy for all absences. There is no need for documentation or proof of an absence.
- Because of the significance of class participation on the learning objectives of this course, daily attendance is extremely important.
- Roll will be called each class or on occasion, a sign in sheet will be utilized to record attendance. Signing in for another student on these sheets will not be tolerated.
- Students are permitted two (2) absences for the duration of the course. On the third absence, a student's overall grade will be lowered by 20%; for example, an 80% becomes a 60%. On the fourth absence, **a failing grade** for the course will be assigned to the student. *Note: Live performance attendance is taken separately from daily class attendance.*
- If absent from class, a student is expected to learn all missed material before returning to class. They may still engage in the Packback discussions online. As mentioned in the late work policy above, a student can **ONLY** make up points from missed assignments by following the protocol for submitting alternative assignments (see *Late Work policy* above).

Sickness/Injury Policy:

o As mentioned prior, no matter the nature of the absence, there is a “no questions asked” policy. If a student is sick and cannot attend class, they **do not** have to inform the instructor. It is the student's responsibility to learn all missed material before returning to class **AND** to make up any points from missed assignments via the alternative assignment policy stated above.

Sickness/Injury Policy (continued):

o If an injury or a condition/illness prevents a student from participating fully in course activities, it is still required for the student to be present for class. To be considered active in class participation, the student must still take part in as many aspects of the class as possible (see *Daily Participation* section). If the injury/illness/condition impacts the student's engagement in the course significantly, the student will be encouraged to reach out to the Dean of Students for further accommodations. The instructor will then work collaboratively with the student to create a plan to ensure continuing engagement in the course.

Tardiness & Early Departures (Classroom):

- Students are expected to show up prepared to start class on time. Anyone who is **more than 10 minutes** late will have their tardy documented and counted against them.
- Early departures from class are not permitted.
- **Three tardies and/or early departures will equal one absence**, with the potential to lower a students' grade.

Cheating/Plagiarism:

NO cheating or plagiarism is allowed. If caught, you will receive a "FAIL" for the assignment and you may be removed from the class! The University upholds a strict policy on academic dishonesty. This can also include falsifying your attendance or misrepresenting work.

Student Submission Standards:

Students must submit high-quality writing that demonstrates critical thinking and clear communication, using APA citation for all assignments that require it. Writing should reflect proper grammar, punctuation, sentence structure, and course vocabulary. The institution's policy on academic dishonesty will be enforced (see section below): [UNT Policy 06.003, Student Academic Integrity](#)

Academic Honesty Statement: Scholastic dishonesty, including cheating, plagiarism, and collusion, violates UNT's Honor Code. As a student, you are expected to follow this code, as outlined in the [UNT policy handbook](#). Cheating involves unauthorized use of materials or assistance, plagiarism is using another's work without acknowledgment, and collusion is unauthorized collaboration. Academic dishonesty can result in a failing grade on the assignment, failure of the course, or suspension from the college.

AI usage: In this course, it is the general requirement that students submit their original ideas and produce work written in their own voice to uphold maximum academic integrity. Although AI is not recommended to draft a submission completely, it may be used to edit and refine a **student's** efforts. It will be assumed that the student's voice and original content will approximately make up 80% of

the work while 20% may be allotted to AI assistance. Overall, a student's original ideas, critical analysis, and creativity will be encouraged and rewarded. In all cases intellectual honesty and integrity will be assumed unless there is reasonable doubt otherwise. In those cases, the instructor will take any necessary action to align with academic standards listed above; i.e., filing a formal report, working with the student to mitigate dishonest behavior, etc.

UNIVERSITY POLICIES

Academic Integrity (Policy 06.003)
