Description: This course will explore the factors that lead to urbanization and its impact on people as well as the environment. Students will learn about major urban issues such as global capitalism, government intervention, the rise of the metropolis, deindustrialization, class differences, spatial location, immigration, ethnic and cultural diversity, racism and poverty, income inequality, crime, unemployment, social movements, and questions needing answers from urban planners and policymakers. In addition, students will also learn urban sociological theories.

GRADE DETERMINATION/ COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Quizzes (75 points): There will be five (5) quizzes throughout the semester. Each quiz will be worth 15 points of your final grade. The quiz will consist of 15 multiple choice questions (each question worth 1 point). The quizzes will cover material from the online modules. All quizzes will be timed. You will be allowed 20 minutes to complete each quiz. Students who do not complete the quizzes during the time period will receive a zero.

Discussions (**40 points**): There will be four (4) discussion prompts. For each prompt, students will be asked to write a substantial or major post worth 8 points each in which there are significant contributions by answering the prompt, asking important questions, and making thoughtful points. A major post should be at least 400 words and students should show clear understanding of the topic. Please use citations and examples from our text to convey points. Students will also be required to respond to one student's post. This response post is worth 2 points and may be in the form of questions, comments, observations, initial reactions, and so on. A minor post should be at least 100 words. All posts should be directly related to the topics and readings.

Reflection Papers (100 points): There will be two (2) papers throughout the semester. Each reflection paper will be worth 50 points of your final grade. Students will be asked to write a 2-page reflection on a topic from the choices provided. More details can be found on Blackboard. Please note that students will be penalized for poorly written work. Please PROOFREAD! You may also visit with a tutor in the Writing Lab (Sage Hall, Room 152 or call 940-565-2563 to schedule an appointment).

Research Project (**150 points**): Students will be divided into groups to provide a 4-page report on the changes that are occurring in a developing country. Students will discuss some of the major factors of urbanism and the impacts of development in that country. Students can select any country of their choice but no two groups can write on the same country. More instructions will be posted on Blackboard. One group member will submit the electronic version of the paper on Blackboard.

Survey Completion (**15 points**): You will be required to complete a survey at the start of the semester. While student responses will not be graded, students will be required to complete the survey within the time frame. A completion grade will be given. Please disregard the grade assigned by Blackboard. Please note that no make-up survey will be given. The survey is worth 15 points. The survey must be completed by **September 3, 2017 at 11:59PM**.
