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## **Course Description**

We live in an increasingly urbanized world. At the start of the 21st century over half of world's population were living in urban areas. Urban sociology focuses on the study of these spaces. The study of urban sociology will provide you with the tools to understand how and why urbanization occurs and what impacts that level of development will have on people living within these urban environments and the natural environment.

## Goals

At the conclusion of this course, you will be able to

- 1. Understand multiple approaches to urban sociology
- 2. Articulate the major factors of urbanism
- 3. Describe and examine how urbanization impacts social phenomena such as culture, the self, social structure, and inequality;
- 4. Better understand the impacts of development in the developing world
- 5. Identify environmental impacts of urbanization

## Discussion Posts

Since this is an online class, discussion forums will be our primary medium for communication. We use the weekly forum to discuss weekly topics and readings, questions related to the readings, and any other issues relating to the course.

**Weekly posts**: Regular and active participation in discussion forums is essential to a clear understanding of assigned topics. You will need to complete **two** discussion prompts. Each post will include the following:

Major post: At least one posting must be a major or substantial post in which you make a significant contribution by answering the prompt, asking pertinent or interesting questions and/or making important, thoughtful points. Technically, a major post should consist of at least 300 words (~1 page double-spaced) and show a clear understanding of the topic. A consistent record of major posts can help if you have a borderline grade at the end of the term.

*Minor post:* The other post may be responses to the postings of others in the class or short questions or statements initiated by you. These posts may be in the form of questions, comments, observations, initial reactions, and so on. A minor post consists of approximately 200 words.

**Grading of posts:** All posts should be related directly to weekly topics and readings. Late posts will receive no points for the week except for documented illness or emergency.

## Quizzes

You must complete the assigned online modules in order to successfully complete the class. At the end of each module, there is a 15-question quiz. You must complete **four out of the five** quizzes. All quizzes will be timed. You will be allowed 20 minutes to complete each quiz. Students who do not complete the quizzes during the assigned time period will receive a zero. Please note that no make-up quizzes will be given.

# Student Response Paper

You will complete a student response paper on any topic related to urban sociology. Please discuss possible topics for your paper in Discussion 2. The SRP must include a title page, 4 pages of content in 12-point font, double-spaced, with 1" margins, and a reference page in any standard reference format (Chicago, APA, MLA, etc.).

# Late/Make-up Policy:

All papers and assignments must be submitted via Canvas before the posted deadline to be graded. Late papers and assignments will not be accepted. Any paper or assignment sent via email or received in person will not be graded. Students should submit papers as a PDF or a Microsoft Word Document. Papers that are submitted in a different format or that cannot be opened will not be graded.
