Course Description

This course examines contemporary works of drama by Latinx artists. The course is geared towards those interested in both production and criticism, focusing on script analysis and critical thought about plays and productions. Students will examine the plays through writing, group/class discussion and a performance project. Rather than try to survey the whole of such an extensive body of work, we will focus on the advent of a professionally-oriented Chicana/o and Latinx theatre, specifically examining significant plays, playwrights, and the theatre groups that produced those plays. In addition to the plays we will study the history of Chicano/a and Latinx theatre, the biographies of particular playwrights and the social and historical context of Chicano/a and Latinx theatre.

Course Goals

The goals of the course are:

• Introduce students to a variety of performance texts and styles

- Develop the ability to analyze and comprehend play scripts, with a focus on the work of Latinx playwrights
- Explore the history of Chicano/a and Latinx theatre in the United States
- Help students participate in and lead critical discussions of theatre texts
- Explore critical and academic writing on plays and theatre performances

Communication

- Mute yourself while others are speaking on Zoom.
- Always be polite and respectful towards classmates and the professor, in email or any other communication.
- Please no sidebar chatting or texting during the Zoom session and in class.

- Always use your professors' proper title: Dr. or Prof.
- Unless specifically invited, don't refer to your instructor by first name.
- Use clear and concise language.
- Remember that all college level communication should have correct spelling and grammar (this includes discussion boards).

Reading Responses

Students will write a response for each play assigned. These will be turned in the evening before every class and should also be a jumping off point for class discussions. Students will share three discussion questions to use in class. Due via email to gina.weber@unt.edu, every week Thursdays by 5 pm. Please see Canvas Module under "Weekly Assignments" for the weekly homework format.

Panel Discussions

Students will work in a small group to lead an investigation of a play read for class. Students should refer to the chapter reading to strengthen their argument. More information and guidelines will be provided.

Final Project

Final project will be determined at a later date. However, in general final project will most likely include one of the plays/topics or playwrights studied in class, or create a new scene drawing on themes from one of the previously discussed plays. Further details will be given at a later date.

Student Conduct

Students should be aware that "acts of dishonesty" include cheating, plagiarism, furnishing misleading information, forgery, as well as theft. The penalties for perpetrators as well as accessories (which includes advising, instigating, or encouraging) are extremely severe and we will uphold the policies and regulations of the University. If you use sources in a paper, you must properly cite them (using MLA format) and give the writer credit. Passing off someone else's work as your own is plagiarism and will result in your receiving no credit for the assignment. If you receive no credit for an assignment for those assignments, there is no way to make them up.
