3 hours. Social and cultural bases of diverse human behavior; social matrix of personality, organization and disorganization. Prerequisite(s): SOCI 1510 or equivalent. Advised for students planning sociology graduate work.

Course Objectives

Having successfully completed the course, students will be able to:

- 1. articulate foundational concepts of sociological social psychology
- 2. discuss the similarities and differences between psychological social psychology and sociological social psychology
- 3. discuss the major theoretical perspectives in sociological social psychology
- 4. discuss the role of social psychology in personal and professional settings
- 5. discuss ways to apply social psychology concepts to personal and professional situations

Course Format

This is an online course intended to provide you with a unique and practical learning experience. The course material will be administered online. You will be introduced to new concepts and material online in Blackboard. You will have the ability to check your understanding and knowledge of the material through mastery quizzes and assignments administered online. It is a course expectation that you will complete the assigned online quizzes, exams, and assignments in the time allocated on the course outline located at the end of this document.

This course will be divided into 4 color-coded sections. Chapters 1-3 (Green) will be covered in the first section, chapters 4-5 (Blue) in the second section, chapters 6-8 (Yellow) in the third section, and chapters 9-11 (Orange) in the last section. Each section has quizzes and assignments associated with it. It is best to take the quizzes in each section prior to taking the exam. In the end, this will benefit you. Please look closely at the attached schedules and due dates. You will be responsible for keeping these commitments. You may complete the course as quickly as you like, as long as you abide by the due dates.

Exams and Assignments

Exams: The course exams are designed to evaluate how well students understand the concepts read in assigned texts. There will be two exams worth 100 points each. The exams will consist of information from the assigned readings for class. The exams will be administered totally online. The dates and material covered by each exam is set forth in the course outline located at the end of this document.

Quizzes: There will be a total of seven quizzes over the reading assignments, worth 25 points each. The quizzes will be timed and completed via Blackboard. Students are responsible to make sure they have a reliable computer and internet connection in order to complete the quizzes (Students are encouraged to use the computer labs if they do not possess reliable computer and/or internet options at home).

Assignments:

Assignments are designed to allow students an opportunity to demonstrate their ability to apply and evaluate course concepts. There will be a total of 5 assignments over the course of the semester, worth 25 points each. The instructions for each assignment are posted on Blackboard, and unless otherwise directed, all assignments must be submitted through the appropriate assignment link on Blackboard.

Attendance

As an online class students are responsible for completing all quizzes, exams, and assignments in a timely fashion. Assignments must be completed by the noted date. Students who are unable to complete an assignment in a given time period is encouraged to contact the professor as soon as possible. The professor is likely to be more accommodating prior to a missed assignment versus afterwards.

Grade Calculation

Final grades will be determined through the use of a point system. The maximum value of each exam and assignment along with the range of points associated with each letter grade are listed in the tables below.
