Course Description

Study of the theory and practice of electroacoustic composition, including a survey of the literature, audio techniques, and studio hardware / software use. Course projects focus on electroacoustic music applications, practical exercises, and original composition.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1. Compose electronic and electroacoustic music using Reaper or another digital audio workstation.

- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of synthesis techniques and the basics of digital synthesis.
- 3. Demonstrate a basic understanding of electronic music history and aesthetics.
- 4. Record and edit samples for the production of electronic music.
- 5. Use a variety of software and hardware including, but not limited to, microphones, portable recorders, audio interfaces, and common plugins.
- 6. Demonstrate a through understanding of sound, digital audio, and experimental computer music principles.

Teaching Philosophy

First and foremost, this is a composition course; my priority is to enable each student's creativity using the means of electronic and computer music to create new and interesting musical material. This will be enabled through extensive listening to a variety of electronic music and critical evaluation of that music as well as the introduction of new techniques and musical ideas to students. Each student is assigned three primary composition projects with the goal of expanding their creativity and musical ability when working with electronic media.
