No required text- or workbook, although the Laitz *Complete Musician* textbook used in Theory 1-2 may be a valuable source of review notes (also in library). Everything used in class (e.g. musical scores for analysis and class notes) and all graded assignments will be provided on Canvas. You may use a digital device like an iPad in class only if you can write/take notes on the PDF scores. I will bring handouts for those who prefer paper.

Broad Course Goals:

Continue developing musical literacy through analysis, as important to informed and rewarding listening and performance of music in the Western music tradition. Theory III focuses on 19th-century Romantic chromatic harmony, voice leading, phrase structure, and form, with some forays into popular music and analytical techniques of the 20th century.

Specific Course Goals:

Adding to the analytical toolbox of Theory 1-2 through study of: chromatic harmony & voice leading, expanded and even exceeded tonality, complex phrase types and phrase rhythms, form, chromatic transformations and modulation by third, music and text relations, and highly complex surface progressions expressive of the usual 18th-century functional progressions.

Financial Aid and Satisfactory Academic Progress

<u>Undergraduates</u>

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid.
