Required Books

Selections will strike a balance weighted towards acquaintance with the canonical masterworks music majors should know and some less familiar works and composers.

Course Goals

In this course we will gain familiarity with the pitch and motivic organization of Western music representative of the 14th-20th centuries, with special attention to the exposition of musical ideas, their repetition, development, and variation. Specifically, we will study models of these forms—painstakingly derived from musical practice, not *a priori* molds for composers—to use as a set of expectations for engaging (in the classroom, your studio, ensembles) as informed listeners/performers with the endless creativity of great composers. Having gained the competence of expectations, we will dedicate most of our analytical energy studying and writing about those ingenious and expressive moments of departure from norms that we so value in great music.

The term paper will involve analysis of two sonatas, one chosen from a group of "normative" sonatas and one from the "extended" group (by Beethoven, mainly). Your paper will include form diagrams of both as well as prose about those departures from the norm you find most significant, interesting, and expressive.

Undergraduates
