THEA 2340: THEATRE APPRECIATION

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Required Text

Robert Cohen. *Theatre: Brief Version*. 11th Edition (Referred to in syllabus as *Theatre*)

You really need the text for this course; if you find an older edition feel free to get it (I wouldn't go back further than about the 7th edition). The biggest differences will be the photos/examples and sometimes the order of the chapters, but you should be able to follow along pretty well. I'll post PowerPoints for each chapter for you to view before you take the quiz, but the quiz will go into deeper detail than the Powerpoint.

Course Description

The study of the elements and production of the theatrical art form. A survey of theatre productions in and around the Metroplex. Field trips. May not be counted toward a major or minor in theatre arts. May be repeated for credit when the productions vary. Satisfies the Visual and Performing Arts requirement of the Core Curriculum.

Due to the ongoing Covid-19 emergency, all assignments will be online; there will be no field trips this semester.

Course Objectives

- To construct social meanings from theatrical performances representing a variety of cultures and historical periods, and relate these to current personal, national, and international
- To articulate and justify personal aesthetic criteria for critiquing theatre
- To analyze and critique all aspects of the theatrical performance and articulate one's opinion through written word.

*Makeup/Extra Credit Performances: There are 2 opportunities for makeup/extra credit performances scheduled this semester. Reviews of these productions will be worth the same amount as the class-arranged productions.

Class

Theatre is a reflection of life and the material in this class will reflect that diversity. If an individual student is uncomfortable with certain language or subject matter it is important that they contact the instructor.

Grading Policy

A point system will be used to determine your final course grade and your individual assignment grades. The final semester grade will appear in letter form, according to the UNT grading system (*i.e.*, "A," "B," "C," "D," and "F").

You may need to enable the closed captions, at least at first, until you adjust to the dialects (takes me about 10 minutes). This is an amazing performance from the National Theatre of the UK—it starts slowly and then gets more and more intense. There's some adult language and violence, and some very frank talk about sexual and racial issues—I'd rate this PG 13.

If you can't get the website to work or don't want to watch this, you can substitute *Machinal* from UNT (see Week 7 below).
