- 2. Develop, improve, and apply critical analytical skills to live performances.
- 3. Discuss a personal sense of aesthetics, including what genres, artists, or works appeal to the student.
- 4. Speak and write in an educated manner on the appreciation of the theatrical art.
- 5. Connect with, consider, and discuss the cultural allusions our society has taken from certain dramatic works.
- Collaborate with classmates on the creation of a creative project in which theatre skills are utilized.

#### **Materials**

Required: Theatre: The Lively Art by Wilson and Goldfarb. The current edition is the 2024 release, but if you can find a used copy, that will be fine (I wouldn't go back further than the 9<sup>th</sup> edition). E-texts are fine, too.
