Course Description: This course is designed to provide a brief cultural and intellectual history of Latin America and its peoples of all races, taking into account geography, economics, politics, and the arts from pre-Hispanic times to the present. At the same time, it is also designed to help students improve their language skills in Spanish.

1. Participation and Attendance (15%): Student group and individual participation are essential for class discussion and thus active daily participation is required. Attendance does not affect your grade unless you miss class. You may miss 3 classes with no penalty but each subsequent absence will result in the reduction of the **final grade** by 3%. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of class and three tardies (arriving after ten minutes from the start of class time) equal one absence. If you arrive late, IT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY to notify the professor at the end of the session. Otherwise, you will be marked as absent.

2. Presentation (5%): Each student will give a presentation on a prescreened topic. It must last 8 to 10 minutes. Keep in mind the following steps while preparing for the presentation:

- 1) Select a topic and date from the course syllabus and talk to the professor at least 1 week prior to the presentation.
- 2) The professor will provide detailed guidelines for your presentation.
- 3) On the day of the presentation, prepare a 1 page summary of your presentation and make a copy for each student and the professor.

*Evaluation criteria: preparation, organization, audio-visual sources, and Spanish.
*Please note that presentation is not an act of reading. You are allowed to take a look at your notes but you **should NOT read** them. If you do not follow this rule, you will lose at least a **50%** of your presentation grade.

3. Pop Quiz/ Homework (15%): There will be several pop quizzes about basic terms and concepts. Its format will be multiple choice or True/False type questions. The professor will randomly conduct a completion check of homework. All assigned homework should be done **before** coming to class.

4. Three Exams (50%): There will be 3 exams covering information on historical events, persons, concepts, geographical terms, and literary texts, etc. No-Make-ups will be given. Note the dates of exams before making travel plans.

5. Final Paper (15%): Each student will write a final paper in Spanish about a selected topic relating to Latin American culture and history. Please keep in mind the following:

- 1) You may choose any topic related to the class, but it must be approved by the professor before you start your research. Please note that the topic of your final paper should be different from that of your presentation.
- 2) The paper format:
 - Length between 850 and 1000 words: **Number of words must be printed at the end of the paper.**
 - Double space with 1 inch margin of each side of paper
 - MLA or Chicago Manual of Style: Bibliography that provides at least three sources for your research.

Make-up Policy:

There will be no make-up assignments given at any time unless a written medical excuse or an official University activity excuse is provided. The student must be prepared to take the missed assignment **upon returning** to class. Preexisting travel plans, family and/or social engagements are not considered valid excuses. No late assignments or compositions will be accepted.

Academic Integrity Policy:

Each student is required to adhere to the Academic Integrity Policy on all work submitted for the course. All work submitted for a grade must be your own. Violations of academic integrity include (but are not limited to) using online translation programs; obtaining help from any other individual(s) (friends, native speakers, former instructors, etc.); copying from the Internet, the readings in the textbook, or another student's assignment.

Cell phones and laptops:

Cell phones must be turned off and kept out of sight at all times during class meetings. Any use of a cell phone or any electronic device in class will significantly lower your participation grade (First Warning- 0%/ Second Warning -20%/ Third Warning -50%). The use of laptop computers in class is not allowed unless otherwise directed by the instructor.
