- *CANVAS*: this course will be conducted via CANVAS.
- *Class lecture*: All the class lectures will be uploaded in CANVAS (**Zoom or Power Point with my audio narration**). Be sure to <u>click "Slide Show</u>" and <u>listen to my recording/explanation along with the written information</u>.
- By 11:00 pm every **Tuesday and Thursday** you will be expected to view the assigned lecture **module** (Power Point with audio or Zoom recording). You will also upload your HW assignment and/or complete the quizzes as part of every module by that deadline (11:59 pm daily). If you do not upload your HW and/or complete the quizzes by the

<u>assigned deadlines</u>, you will be locked out and receive a zero for that HW and/or quiz. These Power Point lectures and their due dates are available through the Modules tab on Canvas.

- Class materials not for the public: You can watch and listen to my Zoom or Power Point lectures as many times as you want, but these materials are prepared for this class ONLY, which means that you are NOT allowed to share the lectures with anyone else NOR reproduce them in any forms. Please note that "Class recordings are reserved for use only by students in this class for educational purposes. The recordings should not be shared outside the class in any form. 1. Class Discussion: A topic for class discussion will be posted either Tuesday or Thursday and will be available by the end of the class day, that is, 11:59 pm. You can also access each forum by clicking on the DISCUSSIONS button in the course navigation links in CANVAS. In order to get full credit for each discussion, you will need to 1) post at least one thoughtful, well-written response to the daily discussion topic in a minimum of four lines and 2) make your comments at least once on your classmates' responses in a minimum of three lines. You are expected to participate in the online discussion actively and your discussion grade will be posted weekly on Canvas based on the daily evaluation:

- **2.** Quiz (10%): Biweekly comprehension quiz will be given during the semester except for the first week that will include a quiz about the syllabus. Each quiz will consist of 10-15 simple questions (true/false, fill in the blank, and/or short-answer type questions) about what you have learned in the lessons of the week. Biweekly quizzes must be taken online by 11:59 PM. The duration of each quiz is limited to 10-15 minutes and you are required to use LockDown Browser to take the quizzes.
 - You can answer the questions easily by reading the assigned texts, doing HW, and reading/listening to Power Point lectures <u>BEFORE</u> taking the quiz. Trying to study and find the answer while taking the quiz will not be a good idea, as many questions will require your understanding of the materials.
 - You are **NOT** allowed to discuss the questions and answers with your classmates; you are **NOT** allowed to consult with or contact other students in any way during and after these quizzes. You can finish the quiz well if you have read the textbook, done HW, and watched the PowerPoint lecture.
- **3. Daily Homework** (20%): Students will upload daily the assigned homework by 11:59 PM. The link to upload the homework will be available online **until 11:59 PM every day** and after 11:59 PM, you won't be able to submit your HW, so don't wait until the last minute! If you have already done your HW, you can upload it a day before. **Late homework will not be accepted** unless the professor approves it.
- **4. Three Exams (3 exams x 20% = 60%)**: Students will take three exams online and a review sheet will be posted on Canvas about three days prior to each exam. The exams will consist of three parts (tentative): identifications, short-answer questions, and essays. The exams will cover the materials from my Zoom or PowerPoint presentations, the assigned readings and homework. Please note that **you are required to use LockDown Browser to take the exams.**

COURSE POLICIES:
