Course Description and Objectives: This course is designed to provide a general understanding of the cultural, historical, political, and artistic practices of Latin America from Prehispanic period to the present. Readings include a variety of texts such as colonial chronicles, essays, short stories, and video clips. Through class discussions, written assignments, and oral presentations, students will improve their communicative skills in Spanish.

- 1. Participation and Attendance (15%): As individual and group participation is essential for class discussion, active daily participation is required. Attendance does not affect your grade unless you miss class. You may miss 3 classes with no penalty but each subsequent absence will result in the reduction of the final class grade by 3%. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of class and two tardies (arriving after ten minutes from the start of class time) equal one absence. If you arrive late, it is your responsibility to notify the professor at the end of the session. Otherwise, you will be marked as absent.
- 2. Presentation (5%): Each student will give a presentation on a prescreened topic. The presentation must last no less than 5 and no more than 8 minutes. Keep in mind the following steps while preparing for the presentation:
 - 1) Select a topic and date from the course syllabus and talk to the professor at least 1 week prior to the presentation.
 - 2) The professor will provide detailed guidelines for your presentation.
 - 3) On the day of the presentation, prepare a 1-page summary of your presentation and make a copy for each student and the professor.
 - *Evaluation criteria: preparation (40%), organization (30%), and Spanish (30%).

- *Please note that presentation is not an act of reading. You are allowed to take a look at your notes but you **should NOT read** them. If you do not follow this rule, you will loose at least a **50%** of your presentation grade.
- 3. Pop Quiz/ Homework (10% each = 20%): There will be several pop quizzes about basic terms and concepts. Its format will be True/False type questions. The professor will randomly conduct a completion check of homework. All assigned homework must be done before coming to class.
- 4. Three Exams (45%): There will be 3 exams covering information on historical events, persons, concepts, geographical terms, and literary texts, etc. No-Make-ups will be given. Note the dates of exams before making travel plans.
- 5. Final Paper (15%): students have two options for the final paper.
 - Option 1: You can write a final paper in Spanish about a selected topic relating to Latin American culture and history. Please keep in mind the following:
 - 1) You may choose any topic related to the class, but it must be approved by the professor before you start your research. Please note that the topic of your final paper should be different from that of your presentation.
 - 2) No internet sources are allowed, except those accessed through UNT library data bases. A minimum of 4 academic sources must be cited.
 - 3) The paper format:
 - -Length between 850 and 1000 words: Number of words must be printed at the end of the paper.
 - -Double space with 1inch margin of each side of paper
 - -MLA or Chicago Manual of Style
 - Option 2: If you decide not to write a final paper, <u>your score for the final paper</u> will be the average of your three exam scores.

Make-up Policy:

There will be no make-up assignments given at any time unless a written medical excuse or an official University activity excuse is provided. The student must be prepared to take the missed assignment upon returning to class. Preexisting travel plans, family and/or social engagements are not considered valid excuses. No late assignments or compositions will be accepted.

Academic Integrity Policy:

The UNT Department of Spanish adheres to the University's policy on Student Academic Integrity. For all pertinent assignments and assessments, the work must be the student's work only (unless otherwise indicated by the course instructor) and should reflect the student's level of proficiency. Students are prohibited from asking another person (i.e. a friend, tutor, or relative) to help them develop or compose a response (oral or written) in preparation for, or while completing, an assignment or assessment that will be graded and

applied to the student's final grade in the course. This includes, but is not limited to, receiving outside assistance with drafting, revising, editing, or developing the content and structure of a response to an assignment or assessment question without consent from the course instructor. Also, the use of translation technology (any digital translation tool or app) is prohibited for all assignments and assessments and will be considered academic misconduct. Information "cut and pasted" or otherwise copied from other sources and used as answers in assignments and assessments will be considered plagiarism. If a student has any doubts whatsoever as to what constitutes any form of scholastic dishonesty, they should consult with the course instructor before submitting their work. Cheating, plagiarism, and other examples of academic misconduct defined by University Policy will result in a zero on the assignment or assessment in question and may be reported to the Dean of Students.

Cell phones and laptops:

Cell phones must always be turned off and kept out of sight during class meetings. Any use of a cell phone or any electronic device in class will significantly lower your participation grade (First Warning- 0%/ Second Warning -50%/ Third Warning -100%). The use of laptop computers in class is not allowed unless otherwise directed by the instructor.

Student disruptive behavior that interferes with an instructor's ability to conduct a class or other students' opportunity to learn is unacceptable and will not be tolerated in any instructional forum at UNT.
