Course Goals:

- I. Exposure to a wide variety of literature for solo voice from the Renaissance to the Modern era and increased understanding of the history and development of various forms of solo vocal music.
- II. Greater awareness of the resources available to the voice teacher and performer.
- III. An appreciation for current issues and trends in vocal performance practice.
- IV. Performance improvement from in-class performances of repertoire.
- V. Students will create a 3-ring binder that includes songs and supporting materials

V. ABSENCE AND TARDY POLICY:

Classroom instruction and student participation are crucial to success in this course. Attendance is required. Quizzes, tests, and class work *may not be made up* in the event of an unexcused absence. Excused absences due to illness or family emergencies must be accompanied by a note from the doctor or other authorized person and I must be notified by 8:00 am on the day of the illness. For auditions and other necessary absences planned in advance, I must be notified 48 hours in advance. Up to 2 excused absences are allowed with this notification. Medical and other appointments must not be scheduled during class time and will not constitute an excused absence. If daily class work or a quiz is missed due to an excused absence, the remaining grades will be averaged. One point will be taken off the final grade for every unexcused absence. Three tardies are equal to one absence (the door is closed at 9:05 so that interruptions will not disrupt the quizzes, lectures, class performances, etc.).

Excused Absences
