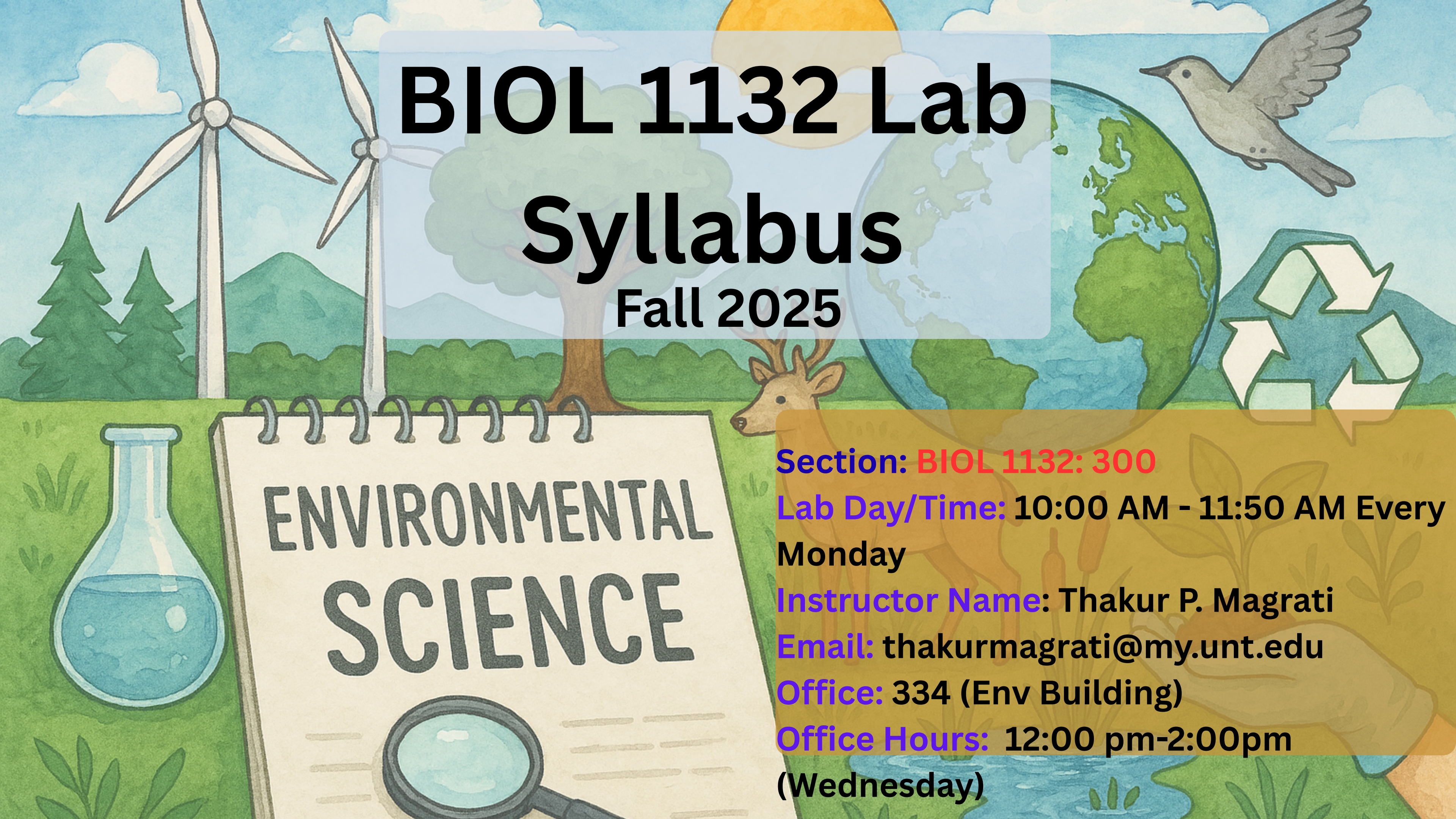

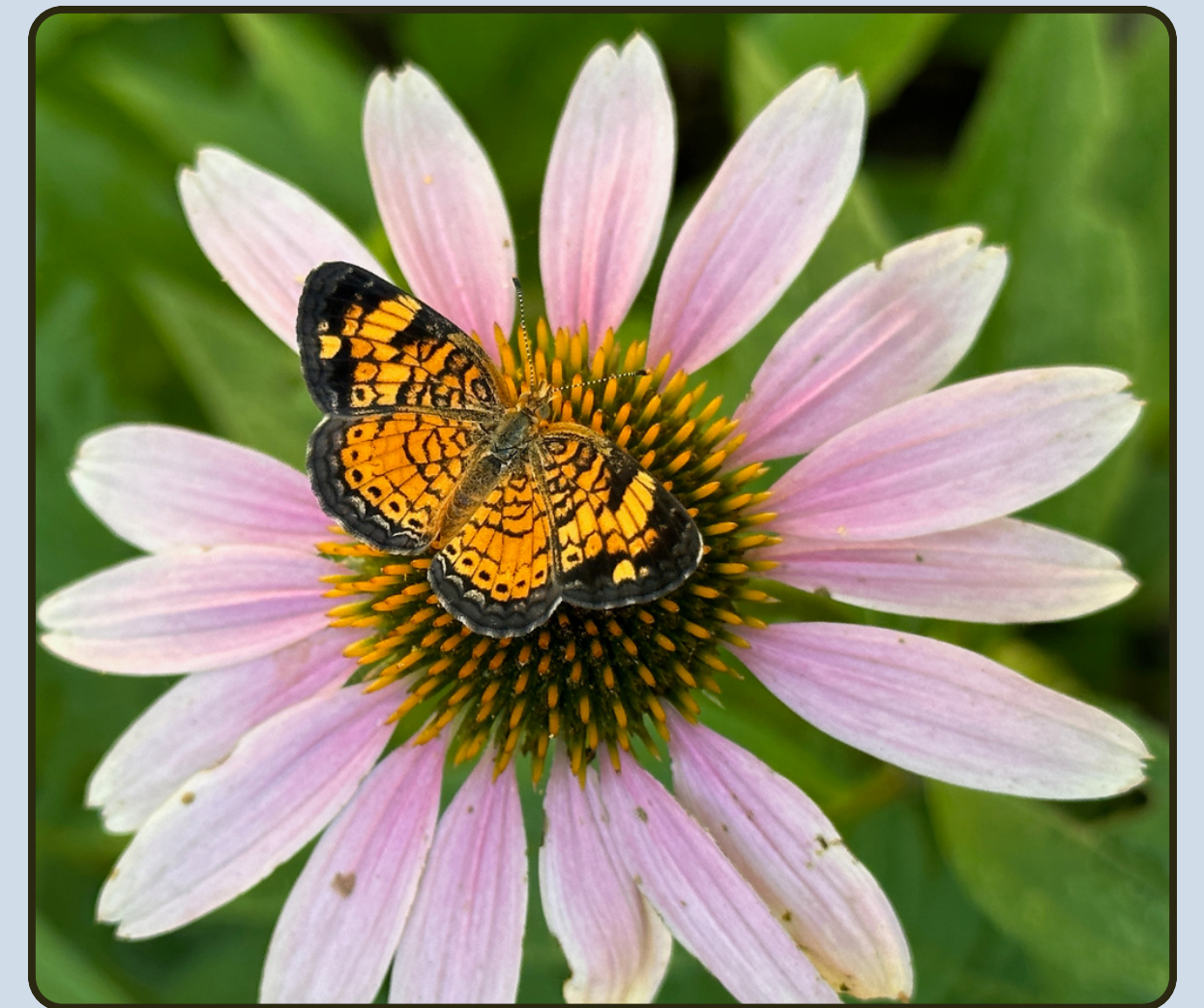
2) Is lab attendance mandatory?

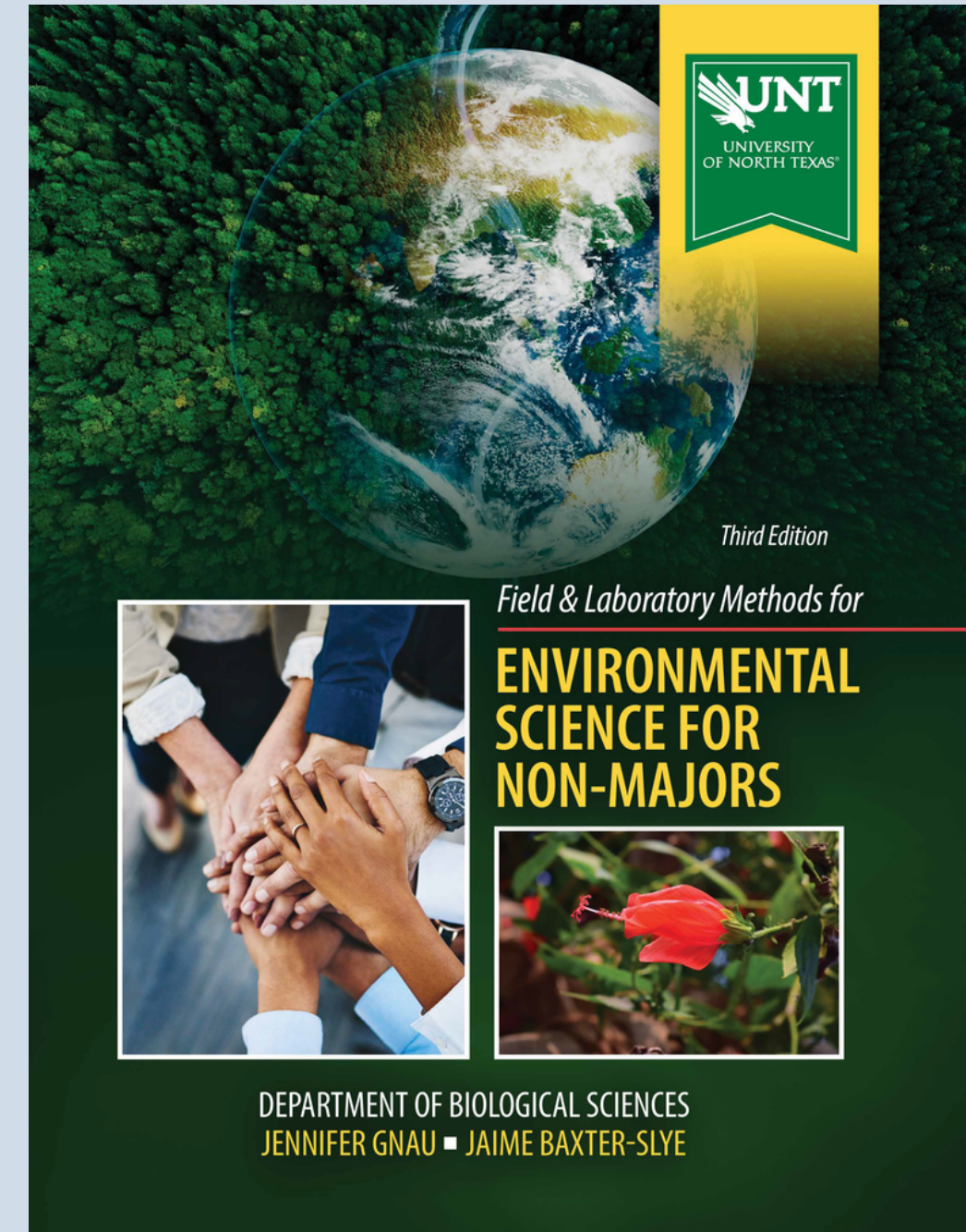

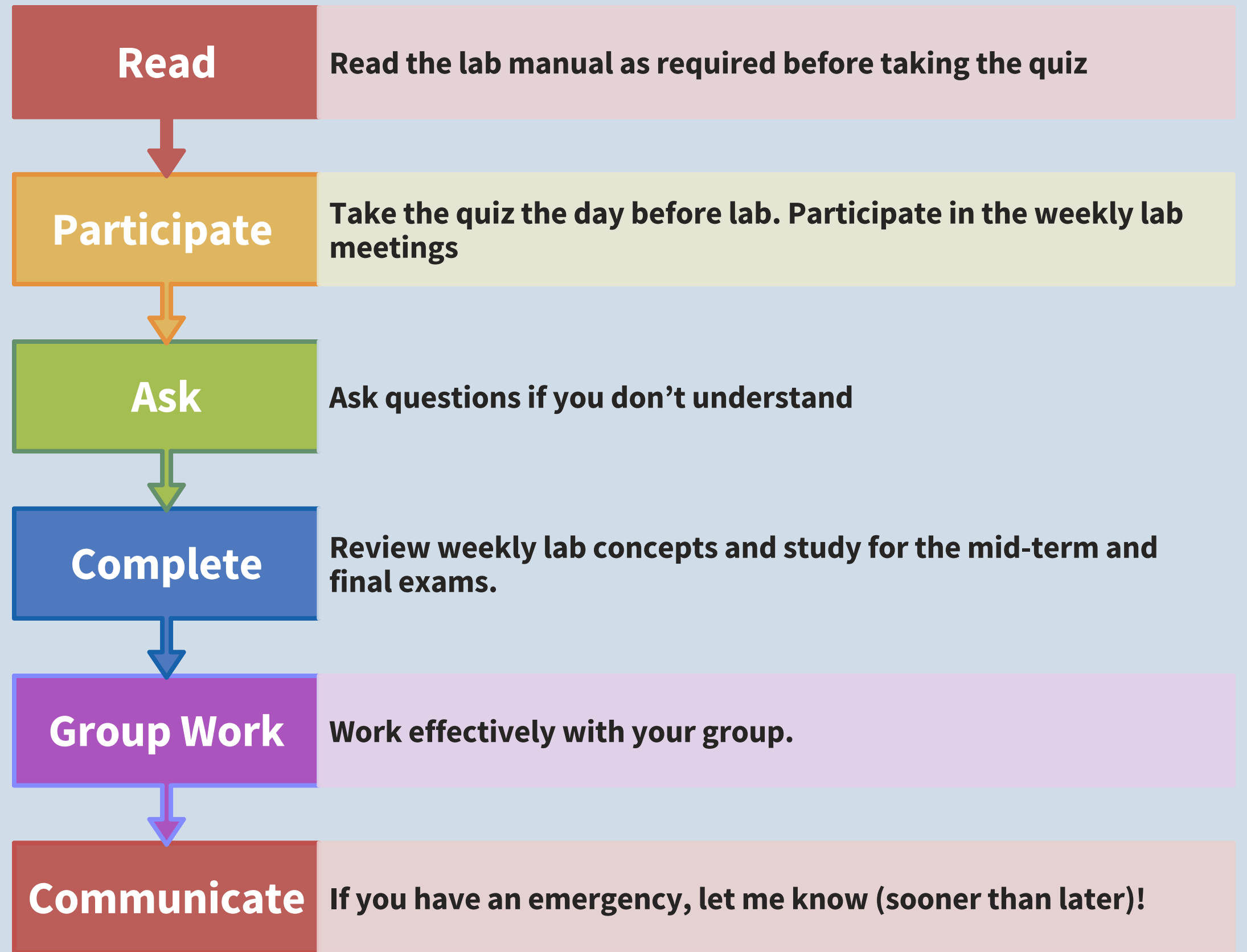

Tests are cumulative and questions will cover any material we have previously learned in lab.

Test material will come from the lab manual, lab activities/experiments, and presentations.

Once you begin the exam, you have the entire lab time to complete. When you are finished, that is all for lab that week and you may leave.

*****IMPORTANT: If you miss an exam, the exam must be made up during the same week. If you must miss an exam: email your TA as soon as you are aware of the expected absence.**

Are there attendance grades?

No, participation grades are “essentially” attendance grades

In the event you miss a lab, you can either:

How can I discuss my grades with my TA?
