# **OBJECTIVES:**

This course will introduce students to the history, theory, creative and technical techniques and general workflow used in film and television editing using industry standard digital editing software. By the end of the course each student will:

Develop critical evaluation skills to determine narrative intent and narrative clarity.

Develop artistic skills needed to make storytelling decisions in each phase of postproduction editing. Learn the technical and critical decision - making skills needed for efficient project completion. Learn how the basic principles and theory of editing applies to various formats and genres of media. Learn that good editing technique, aesthetics and theory are the guiding forces behind editing decisions.

Assignments will be accepted at the beginning of class on the assigned due date. Late assignments will receive an automatic 15% grade deduction. An additional 5% deduction will be applied for each 24-hour period elapsed before the assignment is submitted for grading.

### **COURSE EXPECTATIONS:**

The role of the instructor is to provide each student with the tools, materials and information to needed to fully comprehend the course content and complete all required assignments. The amount of engagement with the course (and resulting depth of knowledge gained) is up to each individual student.

Editing is a both an art and a craft. While it may only take a short time to learn acceptable mechanics and general software tools, a good editor is more than a technician. The most successful editors also understand the language of the visual medium (regardless of the format) including tone, balance, pacing, color as well as the use of music and sound effects. But the story is the primary concern.

Grades on individual assignments will reflect a total evaluation of how well the skills and theories in the course are exemplified. Each assignment will also be graded based on and how closely each project adheres to the instructions and content of the requisite course unit.

### **STUDENT BEHAVIOR:**

These examples will span various genres and cultures in order to expand the student's view of editing styles and techniques. Whether a student has or has not seen the examples used has no bearing on how and when an example will be screened. Various examples of current semester student work may be screened in order to facilitate class discussion. Students are expected to participate in all discussions in a courteous and constructive manner. If there is any uncertainty, please refer to the section on student behavior above.
