COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course trains singers to perform German vocal repertoire with accurate, consistent, and expressive diction. Students are introduced to the International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA) as a tool for precise transcription and pronunciation of sung German. Throughout the semester, instruction focuses on standard German lyric diction as used in classical art song, opera, and oratorio, with attention to vowel formation, consonant clarity, stress, and text intelligibility. Coursework integrates lecture, IPA transcription, text analysis, repertoire study, coaching, and performance, enabling singers to develop both technical accuracy and expressive communication in German.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- Use IPA to transcribe and prepare German song texts accurately.
- Apply correct German pronunciation, vowel purity, and consonant articulation in singing.
- Identify and correct common diction challenges specific to sung German.
- Perform selected German repertoire with clarity, stylistic awareness, and textual understanding.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Due to the experiential and performance-based nature of this course, regular attendance and active participation are essential and will be assessed at every class meeting.

At each class session, students may earn up to 10 points total toward the attendance/participation grade:

- 5 points for timely attendance
- 5 points for active, prepared in-class participation

Attendance points require arriving on time and remaining for the full class. Late arrival will result in a partial or full deduction of the attendance portion for that day. Participation points are earned through consistent engagement in class activities, including IPA work, transcription, singing, coaching, and discussion. Passive presence does not constitute participation.

Because skill development in diction requires in-person listening, speaking, and singing, absences are strongly discouraged. Absences will be excused only in cases of documented emergency, required religious observances, or official university obligations, and only when the instructor is notified in advance whenever possible. Documentation may be required.

Each unexcused absence will result in a deduction from the attendance/participation grade. Excessive absences may significantly impact the final course grade. Students are expected to arrive prepared to sing and participate fully. This includes appropriate physical and vocal readiness and avoiding choices that may negatively affect vocal performance during class.

Extra credit opportunities related to attendance, participation, or course enrichment may be offered at the instructor's discretion throughout the semester.

ADDITIONAL COURSE POLICIES

Phones and other electronic devices must be silenced and put away during class unless specifically needed for course-related activities. Graded work will be returned in a timely manner so students can track their progress, particularly for major assignments, projects, and exams. Students should avoid scheduling end-of-semester juries during regular class meeting times.
