Course Description:

As the course title indicates, this course concerns criminal law. This is the area of law that defines crimes and provides for their punishment. This is a subject that is essential for all students of Criminal Justice to understand.

The course materials will first address general concepts of crime, such as the elements of crime and the parties that can be held responsible for crime. Next, we will address the basic categories of crime, such as murder, robbery, and theft. Finally, we will cover the defenses to criminal responsibility. With regard to these topics, we will cover both traditional and contemporary concepts of these subjects.

The quizzes/exams and discussion assignments are designed to verify and extend your knowledge and understanding of the class materials. The discussion assignments also provide a mechanism to apply such knowledge and understanding.

Goals and Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Illustrate the constitutional limitations on criminal law and how they shape the definitions of crimes.
- Explain the essential elements of crimes and defenses, using both traditional definitions (such as those of the common law) and contemporary definitions (such as those of the Model Penal Code).
- Analyze court decisions that apply criminal laws to individual cases.

Textbook:

The assigned text listed below is required for all students enrolled in this course. Reading assignments are noted in the Course Calendar. All students are expected to read the assigned chapters prior to the date specified in the Course Calendar. The assigned readings will serve as a foundation for the discussion of the issues in class as well as test material.

Required:

Moore, Jennifer L., and John L. Worrall. *Criminal Law*, 3rd ed. New York: Pearson, 2022.

We will use multimedia to supplement the course materials. This may include web articles, podcast, videos, documentaries, and social media. Student's will be notified when additional learning is assigned.

Final grades will be calculated based on total points earned in the course using the indicated scale, not on a percentage basis. I reserve the right to resolve borderline grades if students have first completed *all* the assignments in the course.

Exam:

There will be 3 exams given worth 100 points each. Exams will be administered on Canvas on the day listed on the course calendar. You will **not** come to class in-person on exam days. You will have 60 minutes to complete your exam. You must complete your exam in one sitting, this means you will not be able to save and continue later. The day of the exam, it will open at 6:00am and close at 11:59pm. **No late work will be accepted.** Your exam may consist of multiple choice or true/false questions or short answer questions. Exams will be in Canvas under the Module labeled "Exams".

****Note: It is the student's responsibility to ensure they have a reliable internet connection. It**

is highly recommended students take the exam on campus (in the library or in a computer lab).

Quizzes

There will be 4 online quizzes that will be given throughout the semester. Once the Professor announces that there will be a quiz to the class, you will have until 9:35AM before the next class day to complete the quiz. For example, if the Professor announces that the quiz will open at the end class on a Monday, you will have until Wednesday at 9:35AM to complete the quiz. You will have 15 minutes to take each quiz. **No late work will be accepted.** Quizzes will be in Modules under the section labeled “Quizzes”. The quizzes will reinforce the fact that you are keeping up with the reading and lecture notes. Quizzes will come in the form of 10 questions potentially consisting of: multiple choices or true/false questions.

Canvas Discussion Assignments/Activities:

Each student will be responsible for completing four (4) Canvas Discussion Assignments throughout the course, with each discussion assignment worth 50 points (for a total of 200 points). These assignments will be completed asynchronously through Canvas outside of class. **We will not meet in person on scheduled Discussion Days; instead, the Canvas discussion will serve as the course activity for that day.**

Each discussion will open at 6:00 a.m. on the scheduled Discussion Day and remain available through 11:59 p.m. two days later:

- **Monday Discussion Day:** Opens Monday at 6:00 a.m. → closes Wednesday at 11:59 p.m.
- **Wednesday Discussion Day:** Opens Wednesday at 6:00 a.m. → closes Friday at 11:59 p.m.

Specific Discussion Days and deadlines are listed in the course calendar below.

Students’ initial discussion post must be a minimum of 250 words. Students must reply to at least one other student’s post for full point potential (responding appropriately and meaningfully).

Discussions will be graded on depth of explanation, utilization of sources, connection to course materials, specific efforts to back up your arguments with logical points and sources, grammar and spelling, and adhering to the assignment. ***A detailed rubric for the discussions is provided at the end of the syllabus and on Canvas.***

In order to receive full credit, you must post an original response and respond to at least one other students’ post. ***Note that you will NOT be able to see any other students’ posts until you have first posted a thread yourself.***

When engaging in an online discussion I ask that you remain civil with each other and operate the same way you would if the person was in the same room as you. Use discussions to develop your skills in intellectual conversations about the various topics that we will cover. In the event that there is any foul language or disrespect in the online environment, these issues will be dealt with by the Professor and if the situation merits meeting with the Department Chair or Dean, action

will be taken.

Case Connection Assignment:

Students will complete 3 short Case Connection assignments, one for each exam unit: Chapters 1–5, Chapters 6–9, and Chapters 10–13. Each assignment asks students to read an assigned Texas appellate criminal case and explain how it connects to a criminal-law concept studied in the textbook. The goal is to help students see how criminal-law rules operate in actual Texas cases.

For each assignment, students will briefly explain the important facts, the legal question, the court's decision and main reason, and the connection between the Texas case and the assigned textbook chapter or Court Decision case. Each submission must address the assigned Texas case and be written in the student's own words.

Each assignment will be available at the beginning of its corresponding exam unit and is due on the date of that unit's exam. Refer to the course schedule for specific due dates. Each submission should be approximately 400–600 words (about 1–2 double-spaced pages) and use the required headings.

Students may quote the case sparingly. Any direct quotation must be placed in quotation marks and include a page number or paragraph citation when available. Students should rely primarily on the assigned opinion and textbook; additional legal research is not required.

Extra Credit:

There may be extra credit given but this will be at the discretion of the professor. If this opportunity presents itself, this will be for the entire class and not one individual person. Any extra credit that is given will be given to the entire class. I do not give individual extra credit, so it is important for you to do well on all other course work.

Attendance Policy:

I expect every student to attend class regularly and promptly. Attendance will be taken at some point throughout each class meeting. Students are allowed a maximum of *two unexcused* absences during the semester. You are allowed two, use them for whatever you deem necessary. Remember, however, if you are absent on the day an assignment or extra credit is given, you forfeit those points as they cannot be made up.

A student who is absent from a class session is responsible for the subject matter discussed during that particular session. **I do not give out my lecture notes.** Notes missed (from lecture, guest speaker, presentations, etc.) will need to be obtained from a fellow classmate. It will be extremely difficult for you to obtain an acceptable grade in this course if you miss class consistently.

I reserve the right to request that a student be dropped from the course with a grade of "WF" upon the accumulation of an excessive number of unexcused absences. An absence may be excused for the following reasons: a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose; active military service, including travel for that purpose; participation in an official university function; illness or other extenuating circumstances; pregnancy and parenting under Title IX; and when the University is officially closed by the President. The student is responsible for requesting an

excused absence in writing as early in the semester as possible, and personally delivering to me satisfactory evidence to substantiate the excused absence.

AI/ChatGPT
