## Course Goals

This semester, we will explore the formal and stylistic features of musical styles from around the world. We will review types of chords (including seventh chords and other types), diatonic and non-diatonic scales, different levels of metric cycles, rhythmic motives, tonal centricity, and the balance consonance and dissonance. We will learn how these elements are used for expressive or structural purposes in different types of music. In addition, we will learn about some important means of formal organization for instrumental and vocal music in in different types of music.

\*Note:

- The homework includes written and video submission assignments. All written assignments must be completed neatly in pencil or on electronic tablets (using apps like Goodnotes, Notability, etc.). The video submission assignments should be eligible to assess and in good qualities. All homework should be submitted via Canvas before the due time. **No late submissions will be accepted**. No other submission methods will be accepted unless approved by the instructor.

- There will be **three** in-person exams. No make-up exams will be given unless official documentation is provided.
- In-class performance includes participation, quizzes, and other related activities. Detailed instructions will be provided in class.

## Attendance

Gaining fluency in music takes consistent practice, therefore attending EVERY class is highly expected. It is your responsibility to get missing handouts, assignments, etc. for days that you are absent.

According to UNT's policy, a student's absence may be excused for the following reasons: religious holy day observances, active military service, official University or College of Music functions, medical emergencies and illnesses, pregnancy and parenting under Title IX, official University closure by UNT's President, and other extenuating circumstances on a case-by-case basis (e.g., death of immediate family member). Excused absences do not count against your attendance or lower your grade.

If you have a chronic medical condition that might affect your class attendance or performance, please see the Office of Disability Accommodations. Students who will miss class because of a religious observance should make arrangements to make up the material. Please contact the instructor prior to the event whenever possible with proper proof or documentation.

If you have traffic problems (including the unexpected accidents or hazardous road conditions, unexpected vehicle problems) or other family emergencies, please email me with proper proof or documentation. **Please note that excuses such as "living too far away" do not qualify as excused absences. Students are expected to manage their time and transportation effectively to ensure they can attend all classes punctually. It is essential to account for travel time and any potential delays to avoid being late or missing class.**

Arriving to class more than **5 minutes** late three times will result in one recorded absence. Arriving more than **10 minutes** late is counted as an unexcused absence. Unexcused absences are monitored according to the following schedule:

- 0–4 absences: no questions asked
- 5–7 absences: final grade reduction by 10%
- 8 absences: automatic fail

Due to the large class sizes of this class, attendance may be checked in a variety of ways, such as calling roll, assigned seating, scanning IDs, impromptu quizzes, turning in-class practices, etc. Besides failing to show up, unexcused absences include being non-responsive in class, being unwilling to participate in class activities, leaving class early without the permission by the instructor.

Leaving the classroom frequently can disrupt the instructor's teaching effectiveness and your classmates' learning experience. It is highly recommended that you use the bathroom before class begins. Frequently leaving the classroom during the class will lower your "in-class performance" grade. **Leaving the classroom for aggregately more than 10 minutes during the class will be**

**counted as an unexcused absence.** This policy is in place to address situations where students attend class but leave for extended periods. If you have medical conditions that require frequent leaving of the classroom, please contact the instructor with documentation.

### **Technology policy**

All class materials, including notes, music recordings/videos, scores and grades will be posted on Canvas. You should have access on <https://canvas.unt.edu>.

You may use laptops and electronic tablets for notetaking and in-class practice. However, **phone use is prohibited during class.** Engaging other activities, such as doing assignments for other classes or browsing unrelated contents on your electronic devices, will lower your "in-class performance" grade.

**NO electronic devices are permitted in any exam.** Catching using electronic devices in exam is the violation of academic integrity rules. This will cause a "ZERO" for your exam and the behavior will be reported to the academic integrity department.

## **Financial Aid and Satisfactory Academic Progress**

### Undergraduates

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid. Students must maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total hours registered. Students cannot exceed attempted credit hours above 150% of their required degree plan. If a student does not maintain the required standards, the student may lose their financial aid eligibility.

Students holding music scholarships must maintain a minimum 2.5 overall cumulative GPA and 3.0 cumulative GPA in music courses.

If at any point you consider dropping this or any other course, please be advised that the decision to do so may have the potential to affect your current and future financial aid eligibility. It is recommended that you to schedule a meeting with an academic advisor in your college or visit the Student Financial Aid and Scholarships office to discuss dropping a course before doing so.

### Graduates

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid. Students must maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total registered hours per term. Music scholarships require a 3.5 cumulative GPA. Students cannot exceed maximum timeframes established based on the published length of the graduate program. If a student does not maintain the required standards, the student may lose their financial aid eligibility.

If at any point you consider dropping this or any other course, please be advised that the decision to do so may have the potential to affect your current and future financial aid eligibility. It is recommended you schedule a meeting with an academic advisor in your college, an advisor in UNT-International or visit the Student Financial Aid and Scholarships office to discuss dropping a course.
