Course Description

This course introduces contemporary techniques of multivariate analysis, including association rules, classification methods, time series, text analysis and machine learning methods with an emphasis on applications in science and industry. Introduction to state-of-practice computational statistical and data analysis methods and tools.

Course Structure

This is an 8-week online course designed in a module system. We will meet online via Zoom in Canvas each week. The meeting time is Wednesday 10:00 - 11:50 AM CST. Attending the weekly online meeting is **optional**, but you are required to watch the recordings if you couldn't attend. Students are also expected to participate in various online activities such as watching videos, reading articles, completing assignments, etc.

Course Prerequisites or Other Restrictions

This course requires that the student has successfully completed ADTA 4130, MATH 3680 or equivalent, or consent of instructor.

Course Objectives

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Define key terms and basic concepts in multivariate data analysis.
- 2. Explain how classification and prediction are used in applied analytics.
- 3. Interpret model results in simple supervised learning tasks.
- 4. Apply supervised learning techniques to perform basic prediction and classification tasks.
- 5. Apply unsupervised learning techniques, such as clustering and association rules, to explore patterns and structure in data.



Course Assignment and Project Policies

Quizzes

The quizzes emphasize testing your understanding of the theoretical knowledge introduced in the class. Quizzes will not be timed, and you can save answers and revisit any time until the due date.

Homework Assignments

There will be seven assessment assignments throughout the semester that are related to the materials covered in the modules. You will gain hands-on experience to conduct statistical analyses using Python/Jupyter Notebook via Anaconda. These assignments will include analysis using provided data sets, interpretation of the results of the analysis, or else. Written responses are expected to be free of spelling/grammatical errors.

Discussion

There is one discussion to introduce yourself where you can share information about yourself with the class.

Group Project

In real life, it is essential to collaborate with various colleagues, arrange meetings to plan the execution of the project, collect and analyze the data, and present your findings to different levels of the organization. Groups of students will be formed on Canvas to complete a project of applying data analysis methods to a real data provided by the instructor. More details including a rubric will be posted in the module for final project on Canvas.

- Final report At the end of the course, each group will submit one project report (.doc or .docx). No abstract section is needed but it should include a separate cover page that includes the title and every team member's full name. The minimum requirement for the paper will be at least 12 pages (excluding the cover page), double-spaced, 1-inch margins, free from grammatical errors, in Times Roman 12-point font, and appropriately using APA style for citations and reference list, if any. The paper will be submitted for grading via software that checks for plagiarism so do not submit your files as a compressed file. Plagiarism is a violation of the Student Code of Conduct and will be handled per university policy. One student from the group will submit the project delivery by the due dates noted on Canvas and the Syllabus. Late papers will not be accepted.
- Peer review Each student will provide a peer review on team members' contribution to the final product, and your group project grade will be determined by the quality of the product and your contribution. If everyone contributes equally, all members will receive the same credit. Team members who contribute insufficiently will be deducted points. The professor reserves the right to adjust the team's recommended contribution.

Final Exam

The final exam is comprehensive. You should complete the exam independently and the exam is subject to the UNT honor code and conduct policies/actions.

University of North Texas Compliance
