Course Description

Seminar in Business Ethics (3 credit hours). This course will give students an understanding of the strategic purposes of the firm as both an economic and social entity within society. Topics for the course include ethics in business and ethical decision-making, corporate social responsibility, and stakeholder management. An examination of the organization's relationship with various stakeholders will include shareholders, employees, customers, and the environment. Ethical dilemmas related to each topic are identified and analyzed. Students should consider the course an exercise in applied philosophy, designed to increase critical thinking skills for the purpose of producing more ethical business practices.

Course Objectives

- Ethics: students will understand, identify, and apply the following ethical frameworks in the practice of present-day business operations: virtue ethics, deontology or duty-based ethics, consequentialist ethics, feminist & justice ethics.
- **Business**: students will understand and analyze the ethical nature of business operations and create concatenate ethical business practices.
- **Sustainability**: students will understand and evaluate critical problems in industrial capitalism relative to long-term sustainability.

Required Materials

This course is an Open Educational Resource and does not require the purchase of any curricular materials such as texts or workbooks. Students will need appropriate technology including access to a computer with Internet capability and access to some form of GenAI (such as an LLM of their choice).

Class Structure

This course is taught in-person, utilizing resources online and through Canvas. It is the student's responsibility to be able to access, and appropriately use, online materials and complete course requirements as assigned in the course schedule provided in the syllabus. Course meets F-1 visa requirements for international students.

Assignments are made available on a scheduled basis throughout the semester. Exams and quizzes will only be accessed in person using exam security protocols. Assignment dates are published at the beginning of the semester so students may plan ahead. Students are expected to read or review all the assigned materials on time, per the course calendar in the syllabus. Additional material, which may reflect content newly identified as relevant to the course, may be provided. In such instances, students will be given adequate notice and time to review it.

Grading Policy

Students are awarded points on course assignments following faculty review of submitted work using the grading tools found online in Canvas for each assignment. Students may submit work late for partial credit: 15% reduction in the first 24 hours and a 30% reduction thereafter. No late work is accepted after the Wednesday of week fifteen in the semester. This does not apply to work submitted late that has been excused by University Policy.

Major Assignment Descriptions

Ethical Case Analyses (2 @ 100 points each)

Students will be presented with cases related to modern day business operations. Each case will align with the reading material assigned for that week. Students will then be prompted to analyze the case by heavily utilizing the material from that week while minimizing opining or pontificating. The objective here is to demonstrate an understanding of the material and an ability to apply it.

Reading Quizzes (50 Points)

Students are expected to read the assigned material per the course calendar in Canvas and at the bottom of the syllabus. If it is deemed necessary as a measure of accountability, the instructor may institute short quizzes over the assigned reading. At the conclusion of the semester the total number of points will be converted to 50 and be calculated into the 1,000-point total for the course. Example: If it ends up there are a total of 60 points throughout the semester and a student earns 48 of them, this will convert to 40/50 toward the final grade.

M.E.A.P. [My Ethical Action Project] (200 Points)

An MBA is a practitioner's degree, and while it should be academically rigorous, the focus is on gaining practical skills that are demonstrable in the modern workforce. In line with this thinking, students are tasked to engage in a series of ethical actions outside of the classroom in the setting of a local organization or community group. Full details will be available in Canvas and students are encouraged to start early and ask questions often.

C.R.A.P. [Corporate Responsibility Action Pitch] (100 points)

Students will record a presentation for the class on the need for reform in the business world toward greater corporate social responsibility. Topics may include environmental, social, or operational concerns. The presentations will be in the form of a Pecha Kucha, a brief, highly structured presentation format. The presentation will utilize a form of peer review in which reviewers are granted anonymity to promote critical assessment.

Exams (3 @ 150 points each)

There will be three exams scheduled during the semester, with the third exam being the non-cumulative final. All material covered in class, assigned textbook readings, Internet resources, and videos are subject to appear on the exams. Exams are not open-book or open-note, with the exception of one 3x5 notecard. Other than that, no outside assistance is allowed. Students are expected to study beforehand and use this knowledge to take the exams during scheduled class time. University laptops may be made available if the exams use LockDown Browser.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY
