SPAN 1020 Elementary Spanish Spring 2015

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Course Introduction

Bienvenidos to Spanish 1020. This is the second course of the Spanish Language Program at UNT. It has been designed as a three-credit course for students with some prior knowledge of a second language. Spanish 1020 follows a communicative approach; from the first day you will be exposed, and practice the Spanish language in meaningful contexts through interactions with your classmates and instructor. The preferred language of instructions is therefore Spanish.

Note: The instructor in the classroom will act as "trainer/coach", and you will work extensively in a group and with a partner on various, mostly communicative activities. As such, the instructor will not provide lengthy grammar or vocabulary instruction during class time; you are expected to have studied the assigned material before coming to class, and the instructor's role will be to review and clarify as necessary, doubts or questions you may have after studying the material in advance. If you need additional help you should consult the instructor during office hours, and take advantage of departmentally-provided resources, such as free tutoring. By the end of this course you will have a general knowledge of the grammar of the Spanish language and you will be able to communicate effectively in Spanish at this level.

Learning Outcomes

Students will develop communicative competence at the beginner's level through enhancement of listening, reading, writing and speaking skills in Spanish that will allow them to:

- 1. Demonstrate awareness and fundamental knowledge of Spanish grammar and vocabulary.
- 2. Demonstrate ability to converse and negotiate meaning in basic contexts with ease and confidence at the beginner's level.
- 3. Demonstrate understanding in reading and writing competence in Spanish at the beginner's level through reading and writing activities that require critical and analytical skills.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of some of the significant social, cultural, historical, and political aspects of the Spanish-speaking world and its people

Participation & Attendance

Two Participation/Attendance grades will be given during the semester.

Attendance Most class activities include working in groups and pairs, so your presence is important for you and for the whole class. You are expected to attend all class meetings. Written documentation is required for excused absences.

Absences from or missing class, quiz, test, exam or assignment due date will result in a 0 unless the absence can be excused after the required documentation is presented within three days of returning to class. Preexisting travel plans or work schedule conflicts will not be considered a reasonable cause to excuse an absence from an exam, test, quiz, or assignment and are not valid excuses for class absences. **Sickness without a Dr.'s note** will not be considered reasonable cause for excused absence or make up authorization.

Quizzes

There will be six (6) quizzes covering any vocabulary studied up to the time at which a quiz is administered. The lowest quiz score will be dropped. If you miss a day when quizzes are given, they cannot be made-up, the lowest will be dropped. If you miss more than one quiz and you have a documented valid excuse for your absence, the quiz may be substituted for the day's homework. It must be turned in in-person or on-line the same day it is due.

HOME PRACTICE ASSIGNMENTS

All activities assigned in class or on-line for home practice will be scored. Late or incomplete assignments will not be accepted. They may be turned in for error correction, but will not count. If you miss a day when in-class assigned home practice is requested and you have a documented valid excuse for your absence, you may submit that work on-line the same day it is due or it will not count. If you are absent you must contact a class partner to find out what you missed or if any home practice was assigned in class. Missing class is not a valid excuse for not turning in Home Practice Assignments on that day.

ONLINE HOME PRACTICE (SAM/LAB)

Students will complete activities online at http://www.myspanishlab.com/. This portion of the course consists of machine-graded or instructor graded activities offering extensive practice of vocabulary, grammar, and cultural topics as well as speaking and writing skills introduced in the text. Students must

completely answer in Spanish and according to the instructions all activities in order to receive full credit. The online calendar will show the due dates of activities, and you must receive a 70% or better total cumulative grade in order for the on-line work to count, late or incomplete submissions will not be accepted If you score below 70 at the end you will lose all Home practice points for the on-line portion of your grade.

In case of any technical difficulties, students should contact the MySpanishLab technical support. Students must have an incident number from a previous attempt to resolve an issue with technical support to be able to report an issue with MySpanishLab to the instructor.

Tests

There will be three tests during the semester the dates are already set in the Course Calendar. The content is based on the material covered during class discussions, homework, practice assignments, and assigned readings. If you are absent from a Test please see me to find out if there are grounds for granting an excuse and scheduling a make-up, otherwise a 0 will be entered for the test grade. Every test starts with a listening section if you are late you will miss the opportunity to complete that section. If your tardiness is excused after proper documentation is presented, a makeup may be scheduled. Transportation and traffic problems or difficulties, and/or sleeping in on the day of a test or exam are not valid reasons to grant an excuse.

ORAL Final Exam

At the end of the semester at the time noted in the calendar you will have a conversation in Spanish with your instructor or with a partner covering topics and communicative functions practiced in class. The Exam will be graded on information conveyed, vocabulary, grammar, pronunciation, and fluency, and will take place during class time and/or as scheduled by the Registrar's Final Exam Schedule at http://registrar.unt.edu/exams/final-exam-schedule. In it you will be required to demonstrate the ability to converse and negotiate meaning in basic contexts with ease and confidence at the beginner's level. Practicing your conversational and speaking skills during the semester in every class is essential to be successful in your final.
