## Course Description

• PSYC 3100 is an overview course examining the study of behavior and mental processes, including research methods, social behavior, motivation, personality, culture, gender, & individual differences. At the conclusion of this course, you will have a better sense of the variety of research subsumed under the title "social psychology". As an overview course, we will cover a great deal of information very rapidly. I hope you find this introduction to the science of social psychology both challenging and interesting. Be aware that this course covers violent topics such as discrimination, intimacy, aggression, violence, and questionable ethics. Review the course calendar to see the topic for each week. If you are unable to engage with any of these topics, I kindly request that you do what's best for your wellness and drop this course. Students who stay enrolled are expected to engage with the material each week and complete assessments that demonstrate understanding and application.

#### ASSESSMENTS AND GRADING

#### **Individual Activities**

Individual activities will be provided via Canvas and Vantage as either video activities or polls that you complete by yourself. They are intended to provide you with insight about your own unique perspectives and understanding toward social psychology.

#### Video Activities

Video Activities are available in Vantage and assigned per the course calendar for points. You have two attempts at each Video Activity. Your final score will be calculated by averaging the scores of your two completed attempts. Ten activities are offered, and eight are required. Therefore, if you complete all assigned video activities, your lowest two grades will be dropped. Video Activities take approximately 10 minutes each, if you have read the chapter content ahead of time.

## **Discussion Boards**

Discussion boards (DB) will have two different due dates, each with its own points. You cannot engage in Part II without completing Part I. Pay close attention to those due dates, and program them into your personal calendar. **The Team Introductions DB is required, plus five topic DBs**. You have seven different topic DB

opportunities to complete the five required. Therefore, if you miss a deadline, plan to engage in a replacement discussion board in the future.

# **Exams & Chapter Quizzes**

There will be individual tests and individual reading quizzes during the course of the semester. The exams and quizzes will be handled on Canvas. Individual tests and quizzes will be based on lecture material, assigned media, and assigned readings.

#### Exams

You are required to take 4 exams. These exams will be taken on Canvas. Exams will consist of approximately 55 multiple-choice questions, each worth 2 points. The exam will be counted out of a possible 100 points, but you can score more than 100 points. In other words, each test will have at least 10 bonus points available. You should expect most of the questions to be "application." That is, most questions will have an example of a concept, and ask you to identify the example (in contrast to having you identify a definition.) You will have 1 hour and 15 minutes to take each exam. Most students will not need the entire time. Questions will appear one at a time, with only forward progression allowed, so you must answer the question on the screen as it is presented. Exams are due by 11:59 PM Central on the date listed in the Course Calendar. **Keep in mind that I do not use percentages to calculate your grades. Therefore, if you earn an 88/110 on your exam, then you earn 88 points and not an 80%.** 

#### Missed Exam

If you miss an exam, you can take the **Optional Cumulative Final** during Final's Week. The final will replace your missed exam grade. Exams are open e-book. They are NOT open Internet, and any student caught cheating will be subject to the Professional Conduct Policy described below. I highly recommend that you **NOT use your phone or tablet to take an exam**.

#### **Chapter Quizzes**

Chapter Quizzes are individual assignments, and will cover the materials specified in this syllabus. Each quiz is worth 15 points and may be accessed via Vantage through Canvas. I highly recommend that you **NOT use your phone or tablet to take a quiz**. The Canvas app frequently fails, so if you think you can successfully take a quiz while away from a computer, you have been warned.

- Quizzes will have a time limit, so completing the quiz while looking up the answers for every question will be impossible.
- Students get two attempts at each Chapter Quiz. Your final score earned will be calculated by averaging the points you earned on those two attempts.
  - For example, if you scored an 8 on the first attempt and a 10 on the second attempt, then your final scored earned is 8+10=18/2 attempts=9
- I highly suggest that you read the assigned pages for the designated quiz before you take it. The quizzes can be accessed by clicking on the Vantage link in the Canvas module. There are two possible attempts for quizzes. If you choose to take the second attempt, your two quiz scores will be averaged for a final quiz grade.
  - If you are unhappy with your performance on a quiz, there is hope! There are more quizzes available than required. Thus, if you miss or fail a quiz, don't worry! You have an additional opportunity to help your grade.

 Once the due date has passed for the quiz, it will be removed from Canvas. I will not allow any student to take a late quiz! Therefore, be mindful of the quiz due dates located in your syllabus.

# **Checking Your Grade**

You can check your earned points anytime in Canvas by clicking on the "Grades" button. Be careful! I use a point system, and offer more opportunities to earn those points than necessary. **Therefore, attend to the number of points you earn since your final grade will be based on those total points, and where they fall on the grading scale located below.** 

#### **Grade Disputes**

You have 5 business days to dispute a graded assignment from the time it has been entered into Canvas. Once 7 days have passed, the dispute resolution window has closed. Therefore, if I accidentally missed one of your assignments, or did not enter the right grade, or you feel like you provided a response that should get you more points, tell me within 5 business days so I can fix it!

Application to your experiences and your perspectives is KEY! Therefore, always provide an APA 7<sup>th</sup> edition citation in your discussion board if you use an outside source. - Automatic letter grade drop at the end of term.
- You will automatically fail the course.

## Attendance, Illness, Withdrawal, and Incomplete Coursework

If you miss more than three weeks of class, you need to schedule a meeting with me to discuss steps to take to withdraw from the course or receive an Incomplete grade. A grade of Incomplete is only an option if you meet university and departmental guidelines, including the completion of at least 60% of the course assignments and performance equivalent to a C or better when the Incomplete is requested. Students seeking accommodation must first register with the Office of Disability Accommodation (ODA) to verify their eligibility. If a disability is verified, the ODA will provide a student with an accommodation letter to be delivered to faculty to begin a private discussion regarding one's specific course needs. Students may request accommodations at any time, however, ODA notices of accommodation should be provided as early as possible in the semester to avoid any delay in implementation. Note that students must obtain a new letter of accommodation for every semester and must meet with each faculty member prior to implementation in each class. # Retention of Student Records and Grade Appeals

Student records pertaining to this course are maintained in a secure location by the instructor of record. All records such as exams, answer sheets (with keys), and written papers submitted during the duration of the course are kept for at least one calendar year after course completion except those assignments and exams that were graded and returned to you. Please retain all graded and returned assignments and exams until you are certain that you are satisfied with how your course performance was scored, documented, and submitted to the UNT system. Coursework completed via the Canvas online system, including grading information and comments, is also stored in a safe electronic environment for one year. Students have the right to view their individual record; however, information about student's records will not be divulged to other individuals without proper written consent. Students are encouraged to review the Public Information Policy and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) laws and the University's policy. See UNT Policy 10.10, Records Management and Retention for additional information.

If you believe the final grade submitted to the UNT system is not reflective of your performance, you can begin the formal <u>UNT Grade Appeal</u> process. Students can appeal a grade using this process if at least one of the following is met:

grade was based on unfair treatment;

- instructor departed from standards set out in the course syllabus without a rational academic reason; or
- an error was made in calculating the grade, including failure to factor an assignment, project, quiz, or examination.

If the student believes that the grade was assigned due to discrimination or sexual harassment, the student must report this belief to the Office of Equal Opportunity. That allegation must be resolved through the UNT Resolution Procedures for Complaints of Discrimination, Harassment, or Retaliation, before the appeal can proceed. Change of a grade due to violations of academic integrity cannot be appealed through this process.

The first step is to communicate with me, the professor, about your concerns. If, after that conversation, we do not agree about your final grade, you can move forward in the appeal process by meeting with the Department Chair, followed by an academic committee if warranted, and finally, the Dean. In those reviews, your performance as documented in Canvas and our correspondence throughout the semester will be submitted as evidence for an academic decision.
